NEW RULES ADOPTED.
Steamer Calvin Austin, on the dis-
t. run from Boston for St. John, N. B.,
passed the Cape Elizabeth light-
ship at 3:45 p. m. Friday. In former
years the steamers on that run
made a straight course between the
two ports, but under the new rules
adopted after the Titanic disaster a
course much nearer shore is followed.

CROMARTY'S CHARTER EXPIRES.
The tramp steamer Cromarty is no
longer a Pickford and Black boat.
With her arrival from the West In-
dies via St. John the charter expired
and the freighter will after discharg-
ing load deals at Richmond for the
United Kingdom, where she is owned
by A. M. Stetland and company.
The Cromarty is replaced on the ser-
vice by the Briardene, which is prac-
tically the same size, as is already
known, the Briardene has gone south
on the Windward Islands service and
is homeward bound from Barbados—
Halifax Herald.

INVESTIGATING LOSS OF ERIC.
Last Saturday's Halifax Herald
says: "Captain Lindsay, wreck com-
missioner, arrived in the city yester-
day from St. John to conduct a formal
inquiry into the wreck of the Eric on
the night of the 14th inst. The captain
and officers of the ill-fated freighter,
as well as the members of the crew,
will be required to make statements
before the court of investigation con-
cerning the conditions ruling the
night of the stranding. The court
will sit in the county court house
Monday morning and will be com-
posed of Captains Lindsay, Neil Hall
and J. W. Campbell."

The entire crew of the lost vessel
are still quartered in boarding houses
about the city and will probably re-
main a week, as no steamer is leaving
Halifax for Europe until the latter
part of next week.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A person who is the sole head of a
family or who has been over 15 years old
has homesteaded a quarter section of available
 Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan
or Alberta. The applicant must ap-
pear in person at the Dominion Lands
Agency or Sub-agency for the district
where he desires to be made at any
agency on certain conditions by father,
mother, son, daughter, brother or sister,
or intending homesteader.
Duties—Must reside upon and culti-
vate the land in each of three
years. Homesteader must live within
five miles of his homestead on a farm of
at least 10 acres. Must own and occu-
pied by him or his father, mother, son,
daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader in
good standing may, by permit, a quarter-
section alongside his homestead. Price
\$100 per acre.
Duties—Must reside upon the homestead
or pre-emption six months in each
of six years from date of homestead en-
try (excluding the time required to earn
homestead patent) and cultivate fifty
acres. Duties—Must reside six months in
each year on the homestead, and erect a
house worth \$1000.
