## THE MANUFACTURE OF PULP AND PAPER

About 70 Per Cent. of the  
Pulp Wood Cut in This  
Country is Manufactured  
Here, and the Balance is  
Exported.

(Vancouver World.)  
Manufacturing at home is as bene-  
ficial to our economic welfare as buy-  
ing at home is to our rate of ex-  
change. A pertinent illustration is  
that furnished by Canada's wood  
pulp industry.  
As the government statistics show,  
twenty years ago only 36 per cent of  
our pulpwood actually cut was manu-  
factured in Canada. The balance was  
exported to the United States to be  
worked up there and to make money  
for the United States manufacturer.  
There were only about nine thousand  
employees in the manufacturing in-  
dustry on this side of the border, but  
there were many more thousands in  
the same industry on the other side—  
all profiting out of Canada's raw ma-  
terial.

Three years ago, however, a change  
had come over the spirit of the dream.  
This Dominion then manufactured  
over 70 per cent. of its pulpwood, ex-  
porting the remainder. The number  
of employees had grown to twenty-  
five thousand, and the annual wages  
bill to over twenty million dollars.

That growth continues. The ex-  
ports of the Canadian product yearly  
already exceed a hundred million dol-  
lars in value. Ninety per cent of the  
newsprint manufactured in Canada is  
sold abroad, chiefly in the United  
States. During the coming year, it is  
estimated the newspaper production  
will reach \$50,000,000.

What this industry means to Can-  
ada's economic expansion needs no em-  
phasis. It means increase of prosper-  
ity, a lesser burden of taxes, greater  
commercial stability, a step toward  
the ratification of the present adverse  
exchange with the United States and  
many other benefits.

Whereas if we were still exporting  
our raw products we should be con-  
ferring most of these benefits on an-  
other country.

(The 30 per cent. of pulpwood,  
which according to our contemporary  
in exports, must surely all come from  
New Brunswick, for it is being ship-  
ped out of this province as fast as the  
railways and vessels can get it away.  
—Ed.)

## MILITARY DIRECTOR IRELAND APPOINTED

One of First Acts Will Prob-  
ably be to Abolish the  
"Abroad After Midnight"  
Order.

London, March 30.—General Sir Nev-  
ille MacCreedy the new military com-  
mander in Ireland had a long confer-  
ence with Premier Lloyd George to-  
day preparatory to going to Ireland  
for his new duties.  
A circular has already been issued  
from Dublin Castle announcing the  
constitution with officers, of the new  
divisional police command. General  
MacCreedy-Payne, formerly chief of staff  
of the Ulster Volunteers forces late  
army chief in Ulster has been ap-  
pointed to command the Northern  
District, which includes the whole of  
Ulster and the county of Lough.  
Numerous other appointments have  
been made to the commands in the  
provinces and counties. There was  
a great military activity in North  
West Ireland today. Soldiers and po-  
lice raided many different centers and  
arrested a number of prominent Sinn  
Feiners, including the two Donegal  
members of Parliament, Joseph Sween-  
ey at Burtonport, and Peter J. Ward,  
at his home in Donegal.  
There are now about eight Sinn  
Feiners in Derry prison. They pulled  
out their cell windows today and  
shouted to passersby and are report-  
ed to be giving trouble again. The  
soldiers quartered in the prison have  
machine guns mounted, and an arm-  
ored car is held in readiness in the pris-  
on yard.

Another murder is recorded. A  
young farmer has been found dead on  
the roadside near New Blis, County  
of Monaghan, with his head battered  
in.

London, March 31.—One of the first

## WHERE IS THE MONEY COMING FROM FOR SHIPS

Hon. Mackenzie King Raises  
Question, But is Ultimately  
Satisfied.

House of Commons, Ottawa, March  
30.—Demanding a statement from the  
Government as to where the money  
was coming from before the Opposi-  
tion would agree to the vote of \$20-  
000,000 for shipbuilding estimates,  
which the House had spent discussing,  
Hon. Mackenzie King, leader of the  
Opposition threw a bombshell into  
the debate at a few minutes after mid-  
night.  
"We believe," he declared, "that it  
would be against the interests of the  
people of this country to vote twenty  
million dollars, as we are asked to  
do here, until we know where the  
money is coming from."

Mr. King demanded that the Gov-  
ernment make a statement as to whether  
it proposes to raise this money by  
loans or by what manner. He de-  
clared that as far as the Opposition  
was concerned, there would be no  
vote on the question until they had  
that statement.

Mr. King had attempted to intimi-  
date, reminded the leader of the Op-  
position that it had always been the  
custom to await the bringing down of  
the Budget. The Budget speech was  
always the first intimation of the Gov-  
ernment's financial plans. He said,  
however, that he certainly had no id-  
ea of another popular loan being launch-  
ed.

Hon. N. W. Howel, declared that  
the Government had attempted to in-  
timidate the Opposition and had raised  
the question which was entirely con-  
trary to parliamentary procedure, since  
the time of Confederation. Mr. King's  
position was entirely unwarranted  
and unprecedented, and he would in-  
form the leader of the Opposition that  
he could not intimidate the Govern-  
ment in that manner.

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne said he had  
given the Opposition all the informa-  
tion humanly possible. He had an-  
nounced the fact that there would  
be no loan this year. The Opposition  
would pass the item. This was a mat-  
ter in which the people of the coun-  
try were vitally interested, and he  
could not let the Government be  
brought down and warned the Govern-  
ment that the attitude of the Opposi-  
tion in regard to expenditures would  
be dictated in a large measure by  
that was in the Budget. They had  
no wish to impede the passage of the

## ANNUAL MEETING LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE

Action to be Taken to Close  
up Theatres and Other Like  
Places on Sunday.

Montreal, March 30.—(By Canadian  
Press)—At the annual meeting of the  
Lord's Day Alliance of Canada held  
at the Bible House here this after-  
noon, it was decided unanimously to  
follow recommendations made in the  
secretary's report, looking to the en-  
forcement of the Sunday law in this  
province with particular regard to  
moving picture houses and theatres.  
To give effect to this decision, a  
committee was appointed to co-oper-  
ate with the secretary in framing a  
policy as to what shall be done with  
respect to the Sunday shows. It was  
suggested that in all probability the  
support of the French-Canadian orga-  
nizations will be solicited in this con-  
nection.

A resolution was passed that the  
appreciation of the Alliance be ex-  
pressed to the Attorney General in  
proposing to call the attention of pro-  
prietors of moving picture theatres, or  
Montreal to the fact that they are vi-  
olating the law.
