**Baltimore Club  
Protest Upheld**

Ordered Game Won by Akron  
at Baltimore on Sunday,  
May 31, to be Played Over  
Again on Account of Umpire's Decision.

New York, June 18.—President D. L.  
Pule, of the International League  
announced here today that he has  
upheld the protest of the Baltimore club  
and ordered the game won by the  
Akron club at Baltimore on Sunday,  
May 31, to be played again at Baltimore  
on a date to be agreed upon by the clubs.

The official statistician has been  
instructed to expunge the game from  
his records, insofar as it affects the  
standing of the clubs, and the records  
of the pitchers in games won or lost,  
but in all other respects the records are  
to remain as they now are.

The protest was made on account  
of a decision of the umpire which it  
was claimed had a material effect on  
the result of the game.

**Kelly To Compete  
In Olympic Trials**

Among the entrants for the sprints  
and jumping events at the Olympic  
trials, which will be held Saturday  
at the Exhibition track, is Charlie  
Kelly, one of the few runners in the  
game claiming the distinction of having  
taken the measure of the famous  
Australian, Jack Donaldson. The Central  
crack defeated the speedy Aussie  
at Stamford Bridge, England, in 1913,  
in a running dash. Kelly also won the  
long jump the same day, beating American,  
Australian and English competitors.  
He is in fine shape for the  
forthcoming meet and should give a  
good account of himself. Green, of  
the West End's, is another who is expected  
to make a showing. He was the  
champion sprinter of the Fourth  
Division while in France and was also  
a member of the "six bits" battalion  
relay team.

The entries, which closed last night,

record, is recognised throughout the

**Shamrock IV.  
And Trial Yacht**

Weather Unfavorable for  
Race Arranged Yesterday  
—Challenger Outfooted 23  
Meter Yacht in Sail Stretching  
Spin.

Sandy Hook, June 18.—The weather  
conditions today proved to be unfavorable  
for the trial race arranged by  
St. Thomas Lipton between his cup  
challenger Shamrock IV and the 23-  
metre yacht and the first test was  
postponed until tomorrow at three p.  
m.

The yachts only went out under  
way for a sail stretching spin and then  
returned to their anchorage.

In this informal spin, the challenger  
outfooted and outpointed the 23-metre  
yacht throughout a 10-mile run from  
Sandy Hook to Scotland Light vessel  
and back. Both yachts were under  
lower sails only. The wind was north  
east and light.

The action of the Mexican officials

have to cross into the United States  
either today or early tomorrow.

## BUSINESS CONDUCT BY NATIONAL COUNCIL

Interesting Sessions Held Morning  
ing—Political Standards in  
With and the Planks Adopted  
gates at the Y. M. C. I.—R  
esting Addresses Delivered.

The National Council of Women  
Convention resumed sessions yesterday  
morning at 10 o'clock, Mrs. H. A.  
Goodwin having charge of the devo-  
tional meeting preceding the regular  
session.

Mrs. W. E. Sanford presided, and  
greetings were read from Dr. Stowe  
Gulien and Mrs. Smith, convener of  
Public Welfare, unable to attend.

The business of the morning was  
the consideration of the Women's  
Platform, an interim report being read  
by Mrs. Adam Shortt, convener. The  
platform was taken up section by sec-  
tion. The first part dealt with poli-  
tical standards in the federal arena.

The following planks were adopted:  
Equal moral standards in public and  
private life.  
Abolition of patronage.  
Publication of amounts subscribed to  
party funds.

Open nomination of political candi-  
dates.  
Political equality for men and  
women.

The naturalization of women inde-  
pendent of the nationality of husband.  
The practice of thrift in administra-  
tion of public and private affairs.

With reference to the plank that a  
speaking knowledge of either the Eng-  
lish or French language for men and  
women be required before securing the  
franchise, the following amendment  
was unanimously passed: "That those  
who shall hereafter be added to the  
electorate shall have a speaking  
knowledge of either English or  
French."

Social standards were then taken up.  
The demand for a child welfare sec-  
tion in the Federal Department of  
Health was dropped, as this has been  
provided for.

In connection with the claim deal-  
ing with uniform Dominion marriage  
laws, it was decided that Mrs. Shortt  
and Mrs. Edwards re-draft the resolu-  
tion and present it later to the Coun-  
cil.

The interim report on the Women's  
Platform was as follows:  
Mrs. Adam Shortt pointed out that  
the clause compulsory registration and  
issue of voter's card should read  
"That we support every effort by Do-  
minion and Provincial Governments  
in combating venereal disease, and  
endorse the establishment of free clin-  
ics." Agreed to.

On motion the word "adequate" was  
inserted making the clause "That those  
who shall hereafter be added to the  
electorate shall have a speaking  
knowledge of either English or  
French." Agreed to.

The clause "Uniform Dominion di-  
vorce laws, with a financial barrier,"  
brought about an animated discussion,  
in which the whole question of divorce  
was thrashed out. Mrs. Murray, Hal-  
fax, moved that clause be altered to  
read: "Equality of cause for divorce in  
all divorce courts without any finan-  
cial barrier." Agreed to.

In addition to the plank "Equality  
of opportunity without regard to sex  
to all technical training," a second  
clause was added reading "Manual  
training in all school grades for boys  
and girls." Agreed to.

The clause "The principle of co-  
operation and profit sharing," after  
discussion, was altered, on motion, to  
read: "The principle of co-operation  
between employer and employees be  
recognized." Agreed to.

The clause "The Principle of Collec-  
tive Bargaining," was left for further  
consideration and was taken up at  
afternoon session.

Mrs. Willard Smith was asked by  
W. C.
