HYDRO-RADIAL BILL TO GIVE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE LIVE TOPIC

Possible, However, Separate School Question Will Burst Like a Comet into the Political Sky and Bedim Other Issues Which Now Appear Brilliant and Imposing.

Toronto, Feb. 16.—(By Canadian Press.)—With the opening of the Ontario Provincial Parliament, the foremost issue heard on all sides in the legislature is the Hydro-Radial Bill. The bill will revolve the greatest arguments during the session, will be the Hydro-Radial Bill which the government plans to introduce. It is just possible that the separate school question will burst like a comet into the political sky and bedim other issues which now appear brilliant and imposing, but with the exception of that possibility the Radial Bill looks like the big dispute.

It is a far-reaching question, on the disposal of which may largely depend the future of public ownership in this province. It is of greatest importance to the more densely settled portions of Ontario, but it should, and no doubt should, interest as well the less thickly inhabited constituencies. Many a man who 50 years ago was a little concerned with the hydro-electric projects as he was with Chip's problems is today using hydro energy to light his house and fill his cup, so that it is hard to prophesy which township will be outside the electric railway scheme of the future.

The view taken by the Drury Government is that if municipalities want to build and build radials, they are free to do so by obtaining a majority vote of the ratepayers, that the government will not assist them to finance the schemes, either by guaranteeing bonds or by any legislation which would give anyone the right to fix a slightest responsibility on the province as a whole for losses which these radials may entail. The Hydro-Radial Commission which the government appointed early in its regime went extensively into the radial project which had been proposed under the Conservative Government and pressed again when the Farmer-Labor coalition came into power. This commission came to the conclusion that if these radials were built, the most of them at least, would be more apt to produce deficits than profits for some years to come. The Drury Government has been evidently guided to a great extent by the finding of this commission as well as the history of the steam radials in this country. If the municipalities want to take the chance, will and good, but the Government will not be responsible to the extent of giving the investors to come back in case of failure and urge that the scheme was undertaken on the advice of the government and that, therefore, the latter is morally bound to make good the losses.

In this view which has been the reason for the Government action with regard to the sale of securities with which to finance the radials, it is not fair to say that it would not guarantee the bonds of any hydro-radial scheme, that it would not guarantee the remuneration of a whole to aid in the construction of a railway which would serve only a group of municipalities. The Premier has since gone further and opposes the proposal that municipalities lease the Hydro-Radial Commission so that the debentures as security for opposing the scheme.

The fact that Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro Commission, the "power apostle" he is termed, does not have come out strongly for giving the commission more authority in connection with radials, adds greatly to the interest in dispute, for when such letters are published, the public backs the issue, the public backs the issue.

TOOK SAFE WITHOUT PERMISSION OF OWNER

Is Allegation Laid Against Two Montreal Men—Exploit Aired in Court.

Montreal, Feb. 17.—Fifty hundred pounds of solid steel, in the form of a safe, was transported with extreme labor, but without permission of the owner, from the premises of James Hedge, machinery artist, 88A Innes street, on the night of December 31 last. In the safe were the sum of \$1,500 in bills, \$200 in gold and \$800 worth of jewelry. Accounts of this exploit were heard in the Enquete Court this afternoon when James Seager and Guy, Whites appeared charged with the theft of the safe, but after evidence had been heard, no proof was shown that the accused were connected with the robbery and the case was remanded to February 23 for argument of counsel for defence and prosecution.

German Seafarers Are Excluded From British Ships

Magnanimity of British Seamen Strikingly Revealed in Manifesto from I. T. W. F.

London, Feb. 16.—(By Canadian Press.)—The magnanimity of British seamen is strikingly revealed in a manifesto issued by the marine section of the International Transport Workers' Federation.

As a result of the war activities of German submarines German seafarers are excluded by Act of Parliament from serving on British ships for a period of years, but with a view to finding a road out of this "difficult" situation, the manifesto says, Havelock Wilson, M. P., president of the Federation, tonight in an interview with Hugo Stinckens, the German financier and ship owner, on his recent visit to London.

In the manifesto Mr. Wilson points out that for 30 years before the war he was a great admirer of the German nation, and German seamen in particular, and that thousands of Germans had obtained employment in British ships through his help.

The war, proceeded the letter, compelled the Government to intern German merchant seamen in this country. "Though public feeling ran high at that time, I decided to establish a camp of our own for the internment of German seamen, and this cost the union, of which I am president, over \$25,000.

"Furthermore, I used my influence to get the British Government to allow for 10s. per week to add to the camp of the men in our care.

"I mentioned my intentions and watched over the welfare of these men for over 15 months, and I can produce to you a testimonial presented to me by the camp, testifying to my good treatment and interest in their comfort and welfare."

Apparently Herr Stinckens declined to interest himself in the matter since there is no mention of an interview having taken place.

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CHICAGO FOUND RELATIVELY DRY

SAYS PUSSYFOOT Sees Little Evidence of Illegal Selling of Liquor on Night Trip.

Chicago, Feb. 16.—William E. ("Pussyfoot") Johnson, after being taken about late last night by a reporter to see how prohibition was being violated in Chicago, told The Christian Science Monitor correspondent here today that Chicago was a "prayer meeting" compared to what it used to be when he lived here.

"I went out to see the horrors of prohibition in Chicago last night," Mr. Johnson said. "The city editor of one of the newspapers was anxious for me to go out with one of his men, who told me there was a thousand places selling liquor openly. I'd much rather have stayed in my hotel, but I thought I might do a little good by going to see Chicago's wickedness today.

"We started about eleven and got back at two a. m.; the reporter took me to three places. There wasn't anything being sold at the first, the second was closed and at the third liquor was being sold.

"Now, when I go to live in Chicago there were 7,000 saloons here and 3,000 or 4,000 speakeasies. There may be 1,000 'speakeasies' now for all I know. They are certainly selling liquor. There are hundreds of them. They told me there were 1,000 and we found one last night. But if there are 3,000, Chicago has got rid of its saloons.

IRISH FREE STATE IS FLIRTING WITH U. S.

Studying Possibility of Establishing Financial Relations in New York, Rather Than London.

New York, Feb. 17.—Rulers of the Irish Free State, "for both sentimental and practical reasons," will make a close study of the possibility of establishing financial relations in New York, rather than with London, Sir Horace Plunkett intimated to a group of business men and bankers at luncheon today.

Sir Horace reminded the gathering that Ireland, unlike England, is an overseas country, wholly self-supporting and with growing resources, with an enormous development with satisfactory conditions prevail.

Head transport to supplement the railroad lines of Ireland, with possibly a large utilization, which is likely will be an early development following a return to favorable conditions, he declared.
