REVENUE OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

An Endeavor to Have Them Better Appreciated by the Working Classes.

The question of how the resources of the Public Library can best be made available to the working classes, who do not now appreciate the resources as they should, was the chief matter before the board at its regular monthly meeting yesterday afternoon. There were present Dr. Geo. Wright (chairman), Capt. Mason, A. B. Powell, E. F. Pearson, John A. Miller and John Taylor. It was the general opinion that something should be done, and the board adopted a resolution of Mrs. Pearson requesting the Library Committee to issue a scheme for bringing the library's advantages more prominently before the classes in question. Last winter Chief Librarian Rein had the employees of several large manufacturing establishments invited to evening lectures at the library. This will be continued during the present season. The art books will also be made available to the classes in question. The value of the 50,000 books in the library is not known. It is, however, a large sum of money. The Library Committee's report recommended the purchase of 60,000 new books, and the advisability of issuing new tickets and renewing the guarantees of borrowers next June. The Finance Committee suggested that the books be collected from Dr. M. J. Farley, \$2,000, and from the Ontario Mechanics' Institute for rent, the latter being the library's largest expense. The Building Committee reported in favor of the Alhambra Club being allowed to have a reading room in the building. This was approved. The Central Library and the branches will be closed on Thanksgiving Day.
