United Nations Day

While in New York City, on Man- hattan's East Side, United States President Harry S. Truman headed the list of speakers to commemorate United Nations' Day, the stu- dents of this University were ad- dressed by Dr. F. E. MacDiarmid. Dr. MacDiarmid, Superintendent of Education for New Brunswick, brought home to us the important significance of this day and how, four years ago to date (October 24,

1946), the member nations of this great world organization assem- bled at San Francisco to plan for future world peace and prosperity.

In New York, on Monday, Oct. 24, 1949, the cornerstone was laid for the new United Nations building, which reaches to the sky with such a challenge for its members to ful- fill. Canada's External Affairs Min- ister, Hon. L. B. Pearson, stated that "U.N. is the cornerstone of Canada's foreign policy, and of our hopes for a peaceful world." This sentiment was echoed throughout the world in various forms, and

the student body heard such a thought expressed by Dr. MacDiarmid here at the Memorial Hall last Monday morning.

President Truman introduced the speaker before a large audience. Lectures had been cancelled so that the student body might hear Dr. MacDiarmid's timely commen- tary on the achievements of the United Nations and the future they are building. Dr. MacDiarmid gave a brief history of the U.N., and outlined the work done by UNRRA and various other branches of this world body to date.

Discounts To Students Sought By Nifcus

WOLFVILLE (CUP) — A "pur- chase card" system which would bring retail price reduction to all Canadian university students may go into effect next year if present plans of Nifcus materialize. The scheme is one of the most impor- tant projects ever brought forward by the Federation.

The plan calls for purchase of the "card" from local Student Unions or Nifcus representatives, the presentation of which at ap- proved dealers entitles the bearer to a 10 per cent discount on any

and all goods purchased. Cost of the card, which is one dollar, is solely to defray expenses of print- ing and arrangements with dealers.

The system, which has been op- erating on a nation-wide basis in the United States, has met with a very large measure of success there.

The University of Ottawa is at present using the scheme on an experimental basis under Nifcus supervision. If the system is suc- cessful in the capital city, Nifcus will have it put into effect all across Canada.

The system is a non-profit one. American stores report, however, that their sales volume increased to such an extent that the differ- ence was not noticeable. Another point is that the purchase card would be valid all over Canada, not only in the particular commu- nity in which the home university is situated.
