constable. The Indian was under the influence of liquor and fought hard, wheremon the constable had called on four young men to agulat him, and they were doing so when Chief Ownhagaloose come along and harangued them, telling them that they eacht to have clubbed the policeman instead of helping him-This incident he (witness) had reported to the Department and a special order-in-council had been passed deposing this man Outhagaleese from his chiefehip, and he (as agent) was fermally instructed not to recognize Ouchagaleese as a chief during the period of his deposition. Ombagaleese was so informed at a potlach and of course felt very much disgraced. This was why witness and Omhaguloese "did not know one snother", as the Chief had complained. With respect to the complaint of a chief at Biunden Harbor that timber taken from the reserve had never been reported and also as to non-visitation by the Agents He would deal with the timber matter shortly and when he did so would send in a special report to the Commission. As to nonvisitation of those reserves -- the hostility of the Indiana max in the matter of the potlaches had been so great that he had always, during the past two or three years, met these people at reserves other than their own , although he had visited their reserves at least once in every year. As to Matheelthpe Sam's complaint with regard to a woman being ordered out of her house: Som had told the Commission that it was three years after conplaint had been made before action was taken. While at Alert Bay. Inspector Ditchburn and the witness had gone carefully into this matter, hearing the statements of Sam, Lucy Secured and others. The offence had occurred theree years age but there was no record of when complaint in regard to it was laid. His own diary showed that three several attempts had been made to reach the scene and investigate, but on all but the last occasion it had been impossible to make a landing on account of the unfavorable weather. On the third trial a landing had been made and it had been assertained that the house from which the woman had allegedly been ordered was not on the reserve at all; but on the 201
