

the time of the capitulation was about 2,500 men: of these there were about 1,500 regulars, marines, and sailors sent to France, the remainder continuing in the country under the terms of the capitulation.

The enemy's loss in the town during the siege amounted to about 100 men. The quantity of ammunition must have been considerable, for their fire upon our batteries at Pointe-à-Pères was faint, and their fire upon our works upon the Hauteur d'Abraham was but of a few days continuance, which, with the small quantity found in the town, especially of powder, makes it probable that there is no great plenty of ammunition in the country.

Our loss of men and expense of ammunition during the whole campaign stood as follows:

Officers killed, 18; wounded, 107; total, 125.

Non-commissioned officers, drummers, and privates, killed, 252; wounded, 1,116; total 1,368. Total killed, 270; wounded, 1,223. Grand total 1,493.
