### MURDER MYSTERIES.

There are frequently brought to attention the gruesome evidences of mysterious murders, in which by shrewdness or lucky chance the perpetrators have been enabled to completely cover their tracks and conceal their identity, comments the St. Thomas Times. Not infrequently in these cases the remains of the victims are never identified. These incidents are becoming so frequent that one rarely looks through the daily papers without coming upon some account which belongs more or less fully to this category. There are countries where these concealed tragedies do not often happen. They are from the arrangement of things almost impossible. In Switzerland and Germany, for instance, every citizen, male or female, has a written history, so to speak, in the books of the government from birth to death. (No one can move—not even a servant girl can go from one village to another to take service, without giving notice and registering with the police. It is not permissible either at a hotel or private house to take a boarder or entertain a stranger without reporting his presence to the authorities. By these means, and a system of secret police, the entire population is under a constant espionage. The traveller on the regular tourist lines is hardly aware of this but the moment he moves independently it becomes almost painfully apparent to him that he is always watched.

To the Canadian or American mind this surveillance is extremely distasteful, but it is a question whether or not anarchist plots, lynching bees, and murder mysteries will not compel liberty-loving Canada and free America sooner or later to take the precautions which have been found necessary in the Old World. Such a possibility presents a very undesirable outlook; yet there is an element of safety which we do not now possess, despite the fact that Canada possesses the most efficient detective system and strictest department of justice on the American continent.

### THE RACE QUESTION IN THE SOUTH.

The bitter animosity between the whites and the negroes in the Southern States, which breaks out every now and then in such deadly encounters as that which occurred a short time ago in Washington Parish, Louisiana, is beginning to cause serious anxiety to the thoughtful and law-respecting people of both the Northern and Southern States. The New Orleans Times-Democrat says that the situation is like a man going through a powder-magazine. It needs but a spark. Northerners, as a rule, are not very consistent in their ideas on the question. They are horrified by the tales of the burning of negroes by lawless mobs of whites, and under the impulse of this sentiment many of them believe and declare that the whites should be compelled to give the black race not only political equality, but social equality as well, though if they themselves were asked to recognize the Northern negroes as their social equals, they would undoubtedly decline. The action of the American delegates to the Methodist Ecumenical Conference in London in refusing to stay at the same hotel with their negro confreres is significant of the general attitude of the whites in the United States towards the colored race, and while people in the North talk glibly of the equality of the negroes, they take good care to relegate them to a position of social inferiority, and there is no doubt that their treatment of them would be no whit better than that of the South if their relations were the same.

That the danger of a great outbreak in the South is imminent appears to be the opinion of almost everyone acquainted with that part of the country. Mr. Gustavus Myers, a New

shock, and to have roused negroes and whites alike, though in different ways. The negroes, it is said, have been led to believe that it means an active revival of Federal interference and intervention in their behalf, and in consequence they have become aggressive and insolent in many localities. The whites, on the other hand, look upon it as an intimation that Roosevelt will be against them in their effort to maintain the supremacy of their race. Criticism of a number of irresponsible Northern newspapers has put them in a temper that will stand little more ruffling. The New Orleans Picayune doubtless gives expression to the sentiment of the South in the following paragraph, warning the rest of the Union to keep their fingers out of the affairs of the South:

"Whatever position the people and press of the Northern States may take on the subject, the Southern people will be unmoved, but will continue, as in the past, to manage their own political and social affairs, and to work out the redemption and salvation of their own country from all the political and social troubles that assail it."

### A FRENCH MOVEMENT.

A Parisian women's society has come to the conclusion that the terms madame and mademoiselle, to distinguish married and unmarried women, place them in a condition of moral and material inferiority toward men, who are always called "monsieur," whether married or not, points out the Toronto News. They have decided, consequently, that "madame" is the only proper designation for members of the sex, without respect to age or civil condition, and they will lead a crusade against the use of a separate term for unmarried women.

We hardly think that the movement will find favor among English and American women, or that among us "miss" will ever go out of use as the designation of the unmarried members of the sex of every age. The change proposed by the French ladies might, indeed, find favor with women who have passed the marriageable age, but the girls, who are vastly in the majority, would most certainly be opposed to an innovation which would tend to confuse the fact that they were in the matrimonial market and open to offers. Married ladies, also, with grown-up unmarried daughters, would scarcely welcome a custom which one critic points out, might result in such announcements as that Mr. Blank and the five Mrs. Blanks had gone south for the winter. 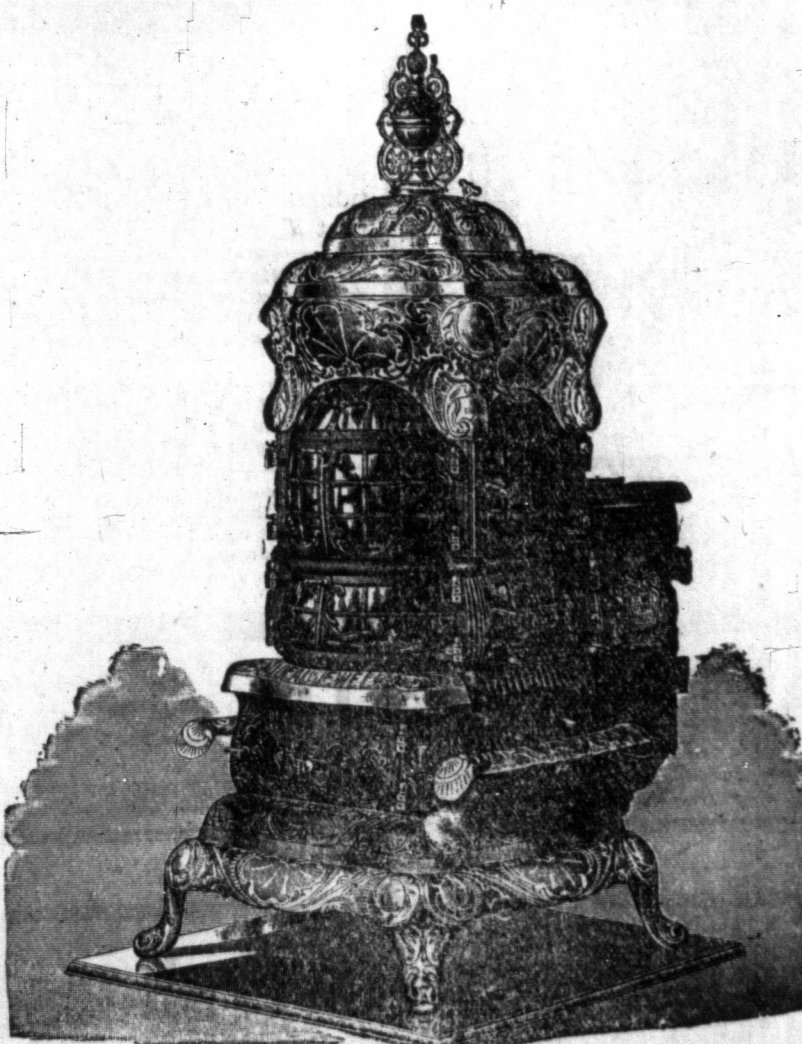
