A BRAZEN CONSPIRACY

South Ontario Political Floorback Takes Sudden Turn.

4 CHARGED WITH PERJURY

Brown Denies Globe's Story—Stanley Gave Him the Money—Effort Being Made to Get Crown Attorney Farewell to Aid in Prosecution of Liberals Who Made Brown Drunk For a Purpose.

Pickering, Jan. 24.—Nicholas Brown of this township, accused of bribery by The Globe, has carried the war into Africa, and will fight it to a finish. Yesterday afternoon he went before Magistrate Bunting to make affidavits on charge of perjury and conspiracy. Squire Bunting, though able to be around and get out, did not feel physically able to deal with the matter. He is 85 years old and his attitude is condemned by no one. Brown and his solicitor drove to Dunbarton, the next most available magistrate. Brown declared he would be at the public meeting to be held at Pickering next night to assert his innocence and defy the whole gang.

The meeting held in the Town Hall last night proved a complete victory for Brown and the Conservatives. Brown manfully repudiated the bribery charges.

Charged With Perjury.

Information for perjury were laid last evening against

William Stanley.

Willard Law.

Lorne Squires.

William Vanstone,

relating to charges of conspiracy in that they accused Nicholas C. Brown of the offence of bribery. These informations were sworn out against the three together, with William Vanstone.

The information were laid before George Parker, J.P. The informant was N. C. Brown himself, acting on the advice of C. C. Robinson of Toronto. The summons were served at the hall after the meeting last night, and the investigation fixed for two o'clock this afternoon at Pickering.

Globe Affidavits Disappear.

Mr. Robinson is now in Whiffy, intending to endeavor to get the assistance of County Crown Attorney Farewell in the prosecution and to try and find the celebrated Globe affidavits, which seem to have mysteriously disappeared.

In his affidavit Nick Brown swears he gave no money to any one on Saturday last with the object of buying a vote. He can prove this by the fact that he was with him when he left home in the morning and brought \$21 back with him at night. He is most methodical in his business habits, and has for years kept diaries and cash books, showing every dollar received and spent, even to the items of his treating expenses, and these he says will substantiate his statements. A week ago he sold some cattle in Toronto to the extent of about \$125, and had some of this on hand.

Stanley Had Big Wad.

His story is that he left home Saturday morning and met Vanstone at Stanley at the hotel in Pickering and considerable treating was done. Stanley had a big roll of bills, as he had been out during the previous night among his friends raising money to cover a bet with George Lang, who had bluffed him the night before. Stanley rolled up the piece of brown paper, which he suggested Brown should put in his pocket and make Vanstone believe he, Brown, had a wad. The Brown did, and wrapped a ball up in it, and this is how the story arose of Brown having plenty of money. The treating was general, but Stanley is said to have spent \$25.

Brown says he handed Law a dollar bill with which to treat the crowd. This was done in the bar, where a large crowd was. Brown was then got in a small treating room, and he was kept there drinking. Lang and two others, who are prepared to come forward under oath and give their evidence, saw Vanstone tampering with Brown's glass. He was then got in the west sitting room, where the alleged bribery is supposed to have been done. Vanstone was on the outside, Stanley inside with Brown and then the others followed.

As Expected Farce.

All the men alleged to have been bribed were dyed in the wool Liberals that no one but a crazy man would ask to change. The absurdity becomes a farce when it is remembered that the hotel was thronged. Every room and hall was filled, and this alleged Conservative emissary boldly bought votes. No wonder Brown's friends say it was a plant and are indignant. Willard Law says Brown was so hopelessly drunk he knew nothing.

It is alleged Mr. Law's affidavit was got on Sunday, the same being taken by L. T. Barclay, local registrar, Whiteby, who went from Whiffy on purpose to do this.

George McGuire about 4 o'clock Saturday got Brown in the cutter and drove him to Rouge Hill. Brown was drunk and had tea there. They returned after 6 and had tea. Brown still being very drunk, also not taking any more liquor. After sitting here he heard the stories that were being circulated and hunted Vanstone up at the Liberal committee room. He called Vanstone out. He asked him what sort of a job he was playing or working on him. Vanstone said he was not working any job but "those fellows got your money and came out and hoisted."

Brown Denounces Vanstone.

Nick asked him how much they said they got. He was told \$70. Brown said they never got a dollar, and that he did not have \$70. Vanstone said, "Yes, you did, you had \$200." Brown declared he was a liar. McGuire counted Brown's money on the way to the Rouge and he had \$21.

The trouble had its origin in the fact that Stanley made a bluff to bet on Friday night at the hotel on Dryden. George Lang called him for \$200 offering his cheque for that amount, and Stanley tanked. The crowd jollied Stanley and he has been looking for blood ever since.

Brown's Affidavits.

This is the affidavit made by Brown, wholly denying the whole charges of 1. Nicholas C. Brown of the Township of

Pickering, in the County of Ontario, farmer, do solemnly declare:

1. That I am the person referred to in the declaration made by William Stanley, Lorne Squires, William Vanstone and Willard O. Law, and published in The Globe of the 23rd day of January, 1906.

2. That I did not, as alleged, give to William Stanley the sum of \$10, or any other sum to induce him to vote for Mr. Calder, nor did I give Lorne Squires \$7, or any other sum for such purpose. I did not give Willard O. Law \$15 or any other sum for such purpose.

3. The three men named in paragraph two hereof are all Liberals of a most pronounced type, and well known in Pickering to be such, and even if I had the desire or intention to bribe an elector, they would all be among the last men to approach, as their politics are well known, and they are active Grit workers.

4. That when in Pickering on Saturday last the three men above named and William Vanstone endeavored successfully to make me intoxicated, and while I was in that condition, it is alleged that I paid the sum above mentioned in order to procure them to vote for Calder.

5. When I left home on Saturday morning last I had \$25 and no more on my person. I was not paid any money by any person while I was absent from home on that day, and did not draw any money from any bank or from any other source, from anybody whatsoever. When I arrived home Saturday night I had \$21 and some silver in my pocket.

6. I never had the slightest intention of paying any person to vote for or use his influence for Mr. Calder, and I declare positively that I did not pay any money to any person whatsoever for any such purpose.

7. The only money I spent for any purpose between \$3 and \$4, Saturday was something between \$3 and \$4.

8. I had no roll of bills in my possession on Saturday night, except \$25 above mentioned, and I declare positively that I had no fifty-dollar bill, as alleged by one Vanstone, but said \$25 was all the money I had during the whole of that day.

9. I have laid information against the said Stanley, Squires, Law and Vanstone, before George Parker, Esq., Justice of the Peace, and an information for conspiracy to defraud the said Stanley, Squires, Law and Vanstone.

10. I hereby declare that the said four persons by surreptitiously filling my glass with beer, and by other means, endeavoring to make me intoxicated, and they conspired to make me intoxicated, and they conspired to make me intoxicated, and they conspired to make me intoxicated.

11. I make this solemn declaration, conscientiously believing the same to be true, and knowing that it has the same force and effect as if made under oath and by Declared before me, in the Township of Pickering, in the County of Ontario, on the 23rd day of January, 1906, F. C. Robinson, a notary public, in the Province of Ontario.

Corroborates Brown.

Richard McGuire, a well known and respected citizen of Pickering, who was with Brown on the Saturday night he was alleged to have committed bribery, corroborates the accused man in the following affidavit, which he made to C. C. Robinson, a notary public, on the 23rd of January.

"I, Richard McGuire, of the Township of Pickering, engineer, do solemnly declare:

1. That on the 23rd day of January, 1906, I saw Nicholas C. Brown at the Hotel in Pickering. He was very much intoxicated, and while I was in the hotel he was sitting at a table with William Stanley. I asked him to come out, and he came. He and I drove to the Rouge, and while on the way I had to drive, as Brown was so intoxicated he was unable to do so.

2. Before leaving the Rouge, and after driving to the Rouge, and after counting the money on the person of the said Brown, and all the bills that he had in his possession were 25 one-dollar bills.

"And I make this declaration, conscientiously believing the same to be true, and knowing that it has the same force and effect as if made under oath, and by virtue of the Canada Evidence Act.

"Declared before me, etc., F. C. Robinson, notary public."

Brown to Sue Globe.

Toronto, Jan. 24.—Nicholas Brown of Pickering, has served notice on The Globe that he will institute a suit for libel for the article published on Monday morning, charging him with attempting to bribe three Liberals at Pickering Village. Mr. Brown, through his solicitor, James Baird, charges that the article has been subjected a malicious attack that not only damages his reputation but also tries to fasten on him a crime of which he is guiltless. Mr. Brown promises to push the matter

It is understood that Kennedy will make a confession and tell the whole story of his connection with that affair.
