## THE MARKET REPORTS.

Grain is Higher—The Live Stock  
Trade—Latest Quotations.  
Wednesday Evening, Nov. 18

## Toronto St. Lawrence Market.

Receipts in all lines were fair at St.  
Lawrence Market to-day. The grain re-  
ceipts on the street amounted to 1,400  
bushels.

Wheat—Three hundred bushels of white  
sold at \$1.50 per bushel, and 200 of  
red sold at 80¢ to 81¢.

Barley—Five hundred bushels sold at  
35 to 36¢ per bushel.

Oats—Four hundred bushels sold at 30½  
cent bushel.

Dressed Hogs—Receipts were rather  
heavy. The market is quoted unchang-  
ing at \$7 to \$7.50 per cwt. for choice light  
weights, and \$6.75 to \$7 for heavies.

Hog—About 25 loads were on the mar-  
ket. No. 1 timothy sold at \$10 to \$11.50,  
and mixed or clover at \$7 to \$9.

Straw—One load sold at \$11 per ton.

## Cheese Markets.

Business was fair at the Montreal Stock  
Yards, Point St. Charles, to-day. Receipts  
of cattle were 600. Prices ranged as  
follows: Choice butchers, 2c to 3c; me-  
dium, 2c to 3c; canners, 1c per lb. Calves  
Receipts were fair. Good calves brought \$2 to \$3.  
Sheep and lambs—Receipts were 400; the  
market was quiet. Hogs—Receipts were  
1,774; prices ranged 50 to 54¢ on a firm  
market.

## Montreal Live Stock.

Montreal, Nov. 18.—At the East End  
Cattle Market to-day there was a fair  
trade. Receipts included 1,000 head of  
cattle, 200 sheep, 100 hogs, and 100  
lambs and 100 pigs. The demand in all  
lines was very fair, and clearances were  
good. The best cattle offered sold from  
8c to 4c per lb. medium animals at from  
3c to 4c and canners 2c per lb. Sheep  
sold at from 2c to 3c per lb. and lambs  
at from 2½ to 4c per lb. Hogs brought  
from 5½ to 6c per lb. and pigs at from  
4c to 5c. Calves sold at prices ranging from  
\$2 to \$10 each, according to quality.
