seven who scored 26; two scoring 27 out of a possible 28. He chose a "Kent" Rifle, value £10. Average of team, 22\frac{1}{3}.

Tuesday, 8th July. This day began with the competition for the "Queen's," first distance 200 yards.

"Second Series Extra Prizes," distance 500 yards. Assistant-Surgeon Vail, New Brunswick, won the first prize, score 27; and having first choice on the prize list, selected an Aneroid Barometer in gilt vase and marble stand, under glass shade, value £12. Average of team 20-08.

Wednesday, 9th July. "Queen's" continued-second distance 500

yards. Our team making average 221.

Thursday, 10th July. "Queen's" concluded—third distance 600 yards. Assistant-Surgeon Vail won himself the 9th place in the first "sixty," making 69 points at the three ranges, winning the National Rifle Association Badge and £12. Lieut. Anderson, Ontario, and Sergt. Harris, Nova Scotia, won £2 each, making 61 points; giving us one in the "sixty" and two prize men.

"Windmill," first distance 500 yards. Average good.

"Alexandra," second distance 600 yards. In this competition at 500 and 600 yards, Boyd, Grand Trunk Engineers, won £9; Harris,
Nova Scotia, £2 8s.; and Omand, Ontario, 11s. 6d.

Friday, 11th July. "Windmill" continued—distance 200 yards. In this competition at 200 and 500 yards, no prize won, but the average shooting of the team was good.

"St. George's," distance 500 yards. In this competition Omand

made 25 points, but did not come in for a prize.

"Martin's," distance 600 yards. Kiddy, Nova Scotia; and Loggie,

New Brunswick, won £2, 2s. 10d. each-making 24.

"H.R.H. the Prince of Wales' Prize," restricted to winners of the N. R.A. silver and bronze medals. For this competition I entered Capt. White, Ontario, winner of silver medal at Ontario for 1872, and Corporal Hickey, of Nova Scotia, a winner for 1871, who had not competed on that medal at a Wimbledon meeting. Distances 200, 500 and 600 yards. In this competition Capt. White won £5.

Friday, the 11th, closed the competition of or which I had entered the team, and on examination of the scores made in these competitions the was much cause for congratulation. The average shooting was good, many prizes were won, and we have a high place among the first "sixty," in the Queen's. Assistant-Surgeon Vail, of New Brunswick, having won this distinction not hitherto attained by a Dominion marksman.

I received a request from the 1st Cheshire Volunteers, with whom the team of last year had a competition at Altcar, and who did not meet us there this year, that we would have a friendly contest at Wimbledon;
