praying the interference of the Houfe in quieting their poffessions in the Lands occupied by them in faid Settlement.

A petition of James Eager and others praying an alteration may be made in the road leading from Annapolis to Liverpool,

Ordered, That the petitions do lie on the Table.

The Order of the day being read,

On motion, the Houle refolved itself into a committee of the whole House, to consider further of a Supply,

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Poole took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair,

The Chairman reported from the committee that they had made further progress in the business to them referred, and that the committee had directed him to move for leave to fit again, on the confideration of the fame, which report the House agreed to.

Mr. Haliburton, purfuant to leave given, prefented a Bill to encourage the raifing of Bread Corn, and clearing new Lands, and the fame was read a first time.

Refolved, That the Bill be read a fecond time.

Mr. Mortimer delivered to the Houfe an account from John Howe and Son, for Printing Militia Laws and Forms of Prayers, amounting to £79 16 o. Ordered, That the account be referred to "the committee of Supply.

A petition of Miles W. Jones, and others, Settlers on the River Mulquodoboit, was prefented by Mr. Pryor, and read, praying an aid for the road leading from that Settlement to Halifax.

A petition of Robert Thomson, was prefented by Mr. Lawson, and read, praying payment of the sum of sive pounds by him expended in clearing out Windfalls on the Hammond Plain Road.

A petition of John Stuart, and others, fettlers on the road leading from Cole Harbour to Halifax, was prefented by Mr. Lawson, and read, praying an aid for the repair of the faid road.

A petition of Alexander Scott, and others, Inhabitants of the Nine Mile River in Douglas, was prefented by Mr. Archibald, and read. praying an aid for repairing the road between the Shubenaccadie bridge and Robert Hall's, on the Truro road.

A petition of Phineas Lovett, Junr. was prefented by Mr. Ritchie, and read, praying for a Drawback of the Impost Duty by him paid on a quantity of Rum, Coffee and Molasses, imported from Jamaica, in the year 1809, amounting to  $\pounds_{40}$  6 11.
