" of this Island, relative to the duties of Impost on Wines, Rum, Brandy and other " distilled Spirituous Liquours, and for allowing a drawback on all Wines, Rum, " Brandy, and other distilled Spirituous Liquours exported from this Island. And " an Act entitled an Act for raising a duty on Wine, Rum and other distilled Spirit-" uous Liquors, and for imposing a Duty on Porter, Ale and Strong Beer."

VII. A Bill entitled " an Act for continuing an Act of the General Assembly "made and passed in the Forty seventh year of his present Majesty's Reign, en-" titled an Act for the purpose of defraying contingent expences of the General " Assembly of this Island."

After which His Excellency was pleased to deliver the following speech to both Houses,

" Mr. Peesident, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council,

" Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

66 TXTHEN the Hoftile Spirit and aggression of the United States of America, imposed on me the duty of Convening the Legislature of this Island, to provide requisite means, for ascertaining the Public fafety, I forrowly beheld the necessity of meeting you, at a feason of the year, in which I well knew, that your agricultural purfuits, and your Commercial Engagements, more than at any other, required your perfonal attentions, and prefence.

" Contemplating the momentous Grifis before us, to the importance and eventual confequence of which, all inferior confiderations ought to give way, I looked forward to the animation of your zeal and loyalty, and relying on your alacrity, in the difpatch of the most immediately pressing objects of your Legislative Duties, I indulged the hopes of being enabled, to afford you, a fpeedy relief, by an early prorogation.

"These hopes however have been disappointed, by various intervening interruptions, in the profecutions of the prefsing objects just alluded to. Among the number of those interruptions, I have to notice, that you deemed it a primary and inevitable object of your Legislative duty, after a forutiny of Elections, an examination of the Public Accounts, &c. &c. diligently to investigate the ground and Caufes of fundry matters and proceedings, appearing to you effentially to effect, the internal peace and tranquility, and the Lives, Liberties and Properties, of His Majefty's Loyal Subjects in this Island.

"While I deeply lament the inadequate efficacy of your Labours, I cordially acknowledgde the candour, afsiduity, and folicitude with which, feveral among you, Gentlemen, have, at the facrifice of perfonal interests, endeavourced to dif. charge your incumbent duties, in the protracted course of this now expiring Selsion.

"No Exertion of mine shall be wanting to bring our Militia Force in a course of Improvemnt by means of Drill and Discipline, to render it qualified and efficient, in the acertainment of the Public fafety.

" Trucking to the fulfilment of your promiles, to provide for its support, I have only to recommend to you, that in return to your feveral Counties, you will inculcate obedience to the Laws, and a due regard to that admirable Constitution which we owe to the Divine Infpiration of the all bounteous providence, and upon which the Glory and Happiness of the British Empire, have, fo long and successfully depended; and let us make our lives happy, in the enjoyment arifing, from a pious. observance of our Laws, being fully convinced of this truth, that, when the Laws are violated, life itself grows insecure, and property ceases to be advantageous."

Prince Edward Island, September 29th, 1812.

The Prelident of His Majsty's Council by His Excellency's Command, then faid, Gentlemen, it is His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleafure, that this General Affembly be prorogued, to Tuesday the Tenth Day of November next, to be then here holden, and this General Affembly is accordingly prorogued to the Tenth day of November next.
