GENERAL RESULTS "EXCELLENT" VIEW OF PARIS

Mistakes of Former Offensive Movements Not Being Repeated.

ADVANCE IS SLOW BUT SURE

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Paris, July 3.—"General results excellent," is the verdict of the Parisian press on the achievements of the second day of the great Franco-British offensive. All the newspapers report that what has been accomplished is rather more substantial than sensational. They declare that the mistake made in the Champagne battle cannot be repeated until the ground has been prepared, so far as humanly possible by artillery. No section of the Franco-British forces was advanced beyond the line assigned to it, they say, however tempting might have appeared the chance of smashing further lines.

An Observer's Story.

The story of an artillery corporal who was wounded while in an observation post at Marcourt, is cited to show that this method is sound. The corporal says: "I was able to see for myself that our losses were quite small, and I am certain that our means of action will enable us to forge ahead without much waste of men. This is due to the prodigious accumulation of munitions of all kinds along the whole northern front.

Terrifying Effects.

"I witnessed the first bombardment of the German trenches and the works. It was a wonderful sight. The effects were terrifying. It is not possible that any work of defence, however strong or ingenious can resist such an avalanche of fire and shells. How many men must lie buried in the ruins.

The German Reply is no less terrible and the most stubborn resistance must be expected upon the advance must be short of men, but certainly does not lack munitions. However, I can affirm that he offered feeble resistance to our first shellings. His guns were heavily shelled. That was characteristic of the section where I was. Did the enemy wish to prevent us from finding out the positions of his batteries or what did this impulsive attack consist of? It made no sense at all. Everything had been foreseen and our plan worked like a charm."

Working Together.

A British officer was wounded and said that what most impressed him was the admirable co-ordination of the French and British troops in his section, where, he said, the local themselves made noble examples of courage, self-sacrifice and heroism," he declared.

Mr. Cosgrave's course on "The Poets and the Mysticism of Hebrew Verse," Dr. Pidgeon in his course on the Gospel according to St. Paul's place in the foundation of the Christian religion. Miss Bignell has interested the younger delegates by an inspiring study of "Jesus, the Man of Galilee."

Miss Saunders, national secretary of the Y. W. C. A., delivered a most inspiring and practical address upon "Women Who Dedicate Their Nation," pointing out as an example, St. Margaret of Scotland, who had consecrated her husband to her prayer, her purity, her helpfulness to her husband, and her unflinching kindness and love to her people.
