## ANNUAL MEETING OF PARIS I.O.D.E.

Prince of Wales Chapter Elected Officers—Other Paris News  
SAD DEATH IN OHIO  
Miss Loretta Norris Died While Visiting Her Brother

(From Our Own Correspondent).  
Paris, Feb. 25.—The Prince of Wales Chapter, Daughters of the Empire, held their annual meeting at the residence of Mrs. A. H. Baird the other afternoon. The reports read were most gratifying, and showed the chapter to be in a flourishing condition. The total receipts amounted to \$3,892.01. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Regent, Mrs. G. Temple; first vice, Mrs. John Penman; second vice, Mrs. N. Moffat; secretary, Mrs. A. J. Sinclair; assistant secretary, Mrs. J. K. Martin; treasurer, Miss A. Craig; standard bearer, Mrs. A. Crooks; co-sec. secretary, Mrs. H. A. Crooks.

Miss Ruth Moffat, a graduate of the University of Toronto, will leave shortly for England to work as V.A.D. Mrs. Moffat is the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. Moffat, manager of the Bank of Commerce.

The death took place in Falkland on Saturday morning of Mr. Stacey Miller. Deceased was in his 64th year, and well known to many in this vicinity. The funeral will leave for England to-morrow afternoon at 2.30 for the Paris Cemetery.

On Friday afternoon Mr. Frank Rickett of Hickert's Corners met with a painful accident. While going to the bus he slipped on the curb, cutting his arm badly below the elbow, and which required four stitches to close.

It is with feelings of profound regret that the community is notified of the death of Miss Birdie Loretta Norris, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Norris, Banfield street, which sad event occurred on the morning of Saturday last. She was only 19 years of age, and was a devoted student at the Central Hospital, where an operation was performed for appendicitis. Deceased seemed to rally nicely from the operation and every indication pointed to her recovery, but a relapse set in on Thursday, when she rapidly sank and peacefully passed away shortly after midnight.

Miss Norris had been the guest of her brother, William, at Ashabula, Ohio, since last October, owing to the illness of her little nephew, Willie, and who she has been in constant attendance on since December last. On February 10th she was taken suddenly ill, and shortly after moved to the General Hospital, where an operation was performed for appendicitis. waiting to be rescued held out hope that others might be saved and the Prospero's commander was directed by the Minister of Shipping to send the names at the earliest possible moment.

Although the sea to-day was not as rough as it was when the steamer struck on the rocks, reports state that it still is extremely dangerous. The Florizel's wireless was wrecked. Fires were out and the ship helpless at the mercy of the waves offered little protection against the cold and the fury of the elements. Many of those lost yesterday had attempted to reach shore in small boats which were tossed about and swamped almost in sight of men and women watching from the bow of the Florizel or from the rigging where a few had climbed for safety. Others who had taken refuge in the forecastle were driven out when that part of the ship was battered in. Reports last night accounted for seven bodies washed ashore. Minister Crosbie said it would be impossible to give the correct number of dead until he had received definite reports from the Prospero and other ships. All told there were 146 persons aboard the Florizel when the vessel sailed from here Saturday night. There were 77 passengers, including twelve women and four children, and 69 officers and men in the crew.

A message from the Prospero early to-day said that 22 survivors had been taken off the disabled ship, with probably twenty others still aboard. Seven bodies were washed ashore last night. Government authorities stated that if the figure as sent by the Prospero were correct the death list stood at 97 provided all reported aboard the Florizel were saved. They declined, however, to announce this as the official estimate of the number dead.

### OFFICERS SAVED.

Bulletin, St. John's, Feb. 25.—Forty survivors of the Steamer Florizel, have been taken off by the Steamer Prospero, which is now on her way to St. John's, according to a telegram received to-day by the Red Cross. Only two names of the survivors were given, one being Captain Martin, master of the ship, the other a seaman named James.

Captain W. J. Martin of the Florizel, Chief Officer James, Marconi Operator Carter, two seamen and John Kielly, a passenger, were among the survivors.

### SHIP WORKERS RETURN

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 25.—The employees of the Collingwood shipyard company who have been out on strike for the past few days, returned to work this morning. Fair Wage Officer E. M. Compton of the Department of Labor here, who assisted in adjusting the dispute, returned to the capital to-day. There are still some points of difference between the company and men and these will be dealt with by a board of conciliation which will be appointed by the minister of labor. About 600 employees were involved.

TROTZKY OUT OF IT  
Petrograd, Sunday, Feb. 24.—Leon Trotzky, Bolshevik foreign minister, will not go to Brest-Litovsk to sign the new peace terms, nor will any of the other members of the Russian delegation which conducted the earlier negotiations there with the exception of M. Karakhan, secretary of the former delegation. The workmen's and soldiers' delegates to-day chose for the new delegation M. Zinovieff, president of the Petrograd council of Workmen's and Soldiers' Delegates; M. Alexeyev, acting commissioner of agriculture, and M. Sokolokoff. This delegation, accompanied by naval and military representatives, will leave to-night for Brest-Litovsk.
