### Threatening The Lazy Child Scientifically

The New Idea Woman's Magazine has taken up the subject of child-training in a new way. It has sent an interviewer to an expert school teacher to find out how it is that children whose parents "can do nothing with them" do not give the least trouble in school. The first interview is printed in the March number of The New Idea, and deals with "The Lazy Child and the Unwilling Child." Some of the points made will surprise and perhaps not convince the average parent. For instance:

"Do you then, not recognize such a quality as laziness in children?" asked the reporter, feeling the infection of Miss Farrell's optimism.

"No. Those who know child nature best tell us that the principle of childhood is activity. If we do not give a child something to do that is suited to him, or if the thing is not presented to him in a way that will appeal to him, then he will refuse it and develop his activity in some other way."

"But surely, to some extent, a child must do the thing that does not appeal to him." This new doctrine of taking the child's nature into account was decidedly upsetting.

"But why? Everything may be made to appeal to a child. Frankly, I do not believe in a child doing a thing simply because it is good for it."

This is a fair sample of the treatment of the subject, which will be found at least suggestive to those aggrieved individuals, active parents afflicted with lazy children.
