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A NIGERIA EXPEDITION. Brilliant British Capture of a King and

His Army. Events in West Africa have quickly succeeded each other in the ast two years that it may be necessary to recall to memory the ex-peditions against the King of Kontagora which took place during the months of January and February, 1901. The result of that expedition was the capture of the large town of Kontagora and the complete defeat of the King's army. The King himself, however, and tion of his men escaped in the direction of Kano, and he collected his forces, numbering about 10,000 men, specially dangerous to hearing and liain a fortified camp at Kaya, near the large city of Maska. During the year he made himself a terror to the towns in the neighborhood, and practically put a stop to the trade the once prosperous town of Zaria. As this state of affairs could not continue, an expedition known as the 'Zaria Relief Expedition' left Jebba, the headquarters of the Northern Nigeria Regiment, on Feb. 5 last. with the object of capturing the king and dispersing his followers. This expeditionary force, left Jebba with 77 infantry, a seven-pounder gun, and a Maxim gun, under the com-mand of Major N. H. C. Dickinson (Leinster Regiment), 1st Battalion Northern Nigeria Regiment, and Lieut. Wright (2nd Queen's), as staff officer, Lieutenant Farquhar, R.F.A., was in command of the artillery detachment. At Wushishi, which was reached on Feb. 11, a detachment of 37 Mounted Infantry under Captain Porter (19th Hussars), was picked up, and here also the expedition was oined by Capt. Abadie (1st Royal Scots), who acted as Political Office On Feb. 20 Capt. Porter was despatched with the Mounted Infantry towards Maska to cut off all retreat in that direction. The re-mainder of the force moved with all speed towards Kaya, but they found it deserted, and it was entered and

burnt to the ground. Capt. Porter on nearing Maska had in the meantime found that the King had fled with all his followers, and was on his way towards Kano. In the distance Porter could see the retreating army of the Kontagoras. and all hope of forcing them to stand seemed gone. However, the Mounted Infantry, although tired out, gave chase in the most plucky manner, and skirting the Northern wall of Maska, Porter, who was opportunely joined by Abadie, came up with the keep alive in aquariums are the herring retreating army some miles along the road, all hurrying towards Kano. Some resistance was made, but the King, on being surrounded by the Mounted Infantry, surrendered to Capt. Abadie, the Political Officer. Meanwhile the Infantry, under Major Dickinson, were hurrying up behind. and completely cornered the whole army of Kontagora. The captive chief, Ibrahim Sudan, is a nephew of the Sultan of Socoto, the second most powerful man in the Moham-medan religion. His capture, with the enormous number of 10,000 men. is the greatest blow yet struck at the Mohammedan power in West Africa. The King himself was personally es-corted by Major Dickinson to Lokoja gaol, and his men were sent back un-der escort to their native towns.
