

### Fireweed as a Honey Plant

(EXPERIMENTAL FARMS NOTE.)  
Fireweed, or Great Willow Herb (*Eriophorum angustifolium*) has produced large crops of white honey of excellent quality in different parts of Canada, especially after bush fires in soil rich in humus or clay. In the North Country this plant secretes more nectar than alkali clover. It is a hardy plant, and its honey is of a fine, rich flavor.

The following is an extract from a letter received recently by Mrs. C. R. Nowlan from her son, Gunner George Nowlan, now serving with the Canadian army in France:

DEAR MOTHER, I do not know when I wrote you last, think it has been over two weeks. However, a person loses all account of time out there since one day is as much like another. I have been very busy of late and I have not written a letter for weeks, not even my diary. One thing, it is practically impossible to write any news. I cannot tell you where I am or what I am doing so what is there to say?

Since writing you last I have received two letters from you—one April 8th, the other, 15th. Also received your box in which everything was so. k. The chicken was fine, so was the cake, also apples. Send as many boxes as you can for our grub! It is scanty. Also send reading material. Frank, Walter and I are in a dugout by ourselves. We dug it straight down in the chalk, six feet deep, eight feet wide and twelve feet long. It was some digging, believe me. We have roofed it with sleepers and covered them with foot plates from the railroad, so it is practically a splinter proof. We would make it gas proof, but I believe the major is going to make us move into some tunnels as soon as they can be made habitable. I got a letter from Ray the other day. He is in the 3th siege. I am both Mack and Roy again, but they have moved away now.

Well, just a year ago to-day college closed and I graduated. It is some ways the time has been very short, in other ways it seems like years. My only worry has been your health which I hope continues good. A year ago now it was snowing and raining but today has been perfect and very, very hot.

The country around here has been very beautiful but it is ruined now. The field near here must have been planted with turnips in '14 when Fritz broke through. Now it is just yellow with turnip blossoms run to seed. First I thought it was c. l. c. k. Do you know what Charlie Schumann is in?

Well, Frank is using the Sterco 1x making coos and frying eggs, so think I better stop writing. Please do not complain about a short letter and do not worry too much about Fritz advancing. The land he is taking is no good and he is suffering enormously. Even so, he will not forget the grub and reading material.

### Sheep Killed by Dogs.

Investigation by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, among sheep owners in 15 States east of the Rocky Mountains shows that out of a total of 6,390,492 sheep in the counties reporting, 34,683 were killed by dogs in one year (1913) and were paid for by the counties. At the same rate of loss in other farm states the total annual destruction of sheep by dogs would be 107,700.

In 1913 crop reports in 36 farm states showed that the number of sheep in those states could be increased 150 per cent without displacing other live stock. Such an increase would place approximately 34,000,000 more sheep in these states than there are now. OF THIS NUMBER REPRODUCED IN PROFITS TO WHETHER SHEEP RAISING IS PROFITABLE IN THE FARM STATES, 83% ANSWERED "YES." OF 804 ANSWERS AS TO THE CAUSE OF PREVENTING INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF SHEEP, 541% SAID DOGS.


### His Refusal.


### All Together For Last Drive.
