SYNOPSIS OF Coal Mining Regulations

Coal mining rights of the Dominion, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-West Territory and British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre, not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal sub-divisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

Every lessee of coal mining rights which are not being operated shall furnish the district agent of Dominion Lands with a sworn statement to that effect at least once in each year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10 an acre.

Important to Exhibitors

Read carefully and study well the Rules

All persons paying \$1.00 may become members of the Cardston Agricultural Fair Association for the current year and will be entitled to free admission to the exhibition grounds.

The price of admission shall be 25 cents for each individual. For children under 12 in charge of an adult the admission to the grounds will be 10 cents.

Competition is open to the world, but all members of the Association will be entitled to free entrance to the fair and all its attractions. Members tickets are not transferable.

All competitors must pay an entrance fee of 10 per cent of the prize money in each section and the entrance fee must accompany each entry. Should it be eligible to compete in more than one section can be entered as often as the animal or animals are eligible.

Entries for all classes will close POSITIVELY at 8 p. m. on Monday September 22nd and must be made personally with the secretary or the assistant secretary or by mail with the secretary. An entry form is affixed to the front of this price list and similar forms may be obtained from the secretary should such form not be sufficient.

The hall will be open for the reception of exhibits at 10 p. m. September 22nd and the committee will be present to receive exhibits and to appportion them to the classes according to prize list.

Judges must report themselves at the exhibition grounds at 9 a. m. sharp on Thursday September 25.

All exhibits must be on the grounds not later than 9:30 a. m. September 25th and must remain till the close of the fair. No exhibit of any kind can be removed at any time without permission from the directors. Any exhibit that has won a prize and is removed by the owner or attendant before the close of the fair, without the consent of the directors, will forfeit any prize or prizes won.

On receipt of entries a card will be prepared for each animal or article, specifying the class, section and number of entry, which card must remain attached to the animal, or its pen or stall, or to the article during the whole period of the exhibition.

The first prize ticket will be red, the second blue, the third white and extra green. No prize ticket will be allowed on animals or articles at this exhibition other than those awarded at this exhibition.

All exhibits must be the property of exhibitor except where, sire or dam and their progeny are exhibited.

Stock and furs are offered for competition or exhibition must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner. Any exhibitor transgressing this will forfeit any cash prizes won at this exhibition. Where any animal or article is exhibited in the name of a company, the names of the individuals constituting the firm must be supplied to the secretary when the entry is made.

All grain, roots, vegetables, dairy products etc. must have been grown or manufactured by the exhibitors and must not have received a previous prize from this association.

In sections for grains, grasses, roots and vegetables, each exhibitor is limited to but one entry in each section of any one variety.

Each animal brought to the exhibition grounds must be provided with a secure fastening and must be placed on the grounds where directed by the officers of the association.

Horses or mares shown as a team must both belong to the exhibitor.

When any animal is entered in a section calling for pure bred animals a copy of the registered pedigree of each animal must be left with the secretary at the time of making the entry, together with the name of the animal and the registered number of the animal.

Any person wilfully misrepresenting any article or animal entered for competition, by giving false information thereon shall forfeit all rights to the benefits of membership in the association for the term of one year and also forfeit all prizes won at this show with each and every exhibit made.

Articles of animals on exhibition shall not be handled except by the officers of each department or by leave of the officers of each department.

Any distinguishing mark, name or initial on sack, vessel or other covering in which exhibits are presented at the fair or on the exhibit itself other than brands shall be removed before the exhibit is judged.

No person shall act as judge in any section in which any - or he is an exhibitor.

Any person making known or pointing out to the judges or officers of the stock, as having lost articles or livestock, before the judging has taken place, shall forfeit all rights to a prize or prizes on such exhibit or exhibits.

No person other than an officer of the fair shall be allowed to go near the judges during the time of judging the live stock or any exhibit. No exhibitor shall interfere with a judge in any manner while that judge is engaged in the execution of his duties. Forfeiture of all prizes won at this fair will be the penalty for the infraction of this rule.

In the absence of sufficient competition in any one section, or in the absence of sufficient merit in any exhibit or exhibits, the judges are instructed to award only such prizes as they think the exhibits are entitled to. They will be requested to use their discretion in this matter as to whether they will award first, second or third prize, or withhold all prizes for want of merit.

The judges may recommend articles or live stock for special prizes although these exhibits are not mentioned on the prize list, but a section will not be made unless at least three entries are guaranteed in any section to be added.

The directors and officers of the association shall be arbitrators of and shall have power to settle all disputes that may arise in regard to any exhibit, or in regard to any matter connected with the fair, and their decision shall be final.

In the case of a protest being made against any award by a judge that protest must be made in writing to the secretary to present to the directors of the association. A meeting of the officers of the association shall be held as soon as possible after a dispute has arisen and their decision shall be final. When a protest is made against any decision of any judge the protest must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be returned to the exhibitor making the protest if the protest is sustained but will be forfeited to the association if the protest is not sustained.

SPECIAL PRIZES

A special prize for the best bushel of any variety of spring wheat will be donated by Mr. T. H. Moffat. This prize will have to be won twice by an exhibitor before becoming his absolute property. Won in 1906 by J. W. Woolf M. P.

A special prize will be donated by Mr. E. N. Barker for the best bushel of Red Winter wheat. This prize will have to be won twice by an exhibitor before becoming his property. Won in 1906 by T. H. Woolford.

The winner of the above prizes will be allowed to hold the prize until the first day of the Cardston Agricultural Fair of 1907. On that day he must produce the prize which will be put up for competition again, but should the winner of either prize in 1906 win the same prize again it becomes his absolute property. But should he lose it, the prize goes to the winner in 1907, to be held till the date of fair of 1908. The prizes here mentioned can only become the absolute property of any one by winning twice on the same variety of wheat in two separate years, and can only be held by an exhibitor unless won outright.

A special prize is offered of \$8.00 by Messrs Leavitt for the best 2 year old gelding or filly, for the best yearling \$5.00, and the best foal \$2.00. Only sons and daughters of the purebred stallion Bright Victor will be eligible to compete for these three specials.
