Bugler Reaches Hoary Old Age

Tale of How Legion of Honor Was Obtained Retold After 70 Years

The bugler, Rolland, was decorated with the Legion of Honor on Aug. 21, 1846, for his heroic conduct in Africa during the skirmish of Sidi Brahim.
