Nanaimo Electors Return Old Council to Power

Ald. McKenzie Elected Mayor By a Handsome Majority

Every Member of Old Council Who Sought Re-Election Was Returned—Retiring Members of School Board Were Re-Elected, and Citizens Voted in Favor of Wednesday Half Holiday—Ratepayers in Favor of City Purchasing the Athletic Club Property.

Nanaimo's Municipal Elections were held yesterday. Interest centering in the Mayoralty contest between three members of the 1916 Council, Ald. McKenzie being elected by a majority of 122 over his nearest opponent, Ald. Shaw, while Ald. James Young polled only 181 votes.

All the members of the old Council who sought re-election were returned. Ald. Forrester and Ald. Coburn were re-elected in the North Ward; Ald. Morton and Ald. Harding in the Middle Ward, while the South Ward returned Ald. Ferguson and elected Mr. John Sharp at the head of the poll.

The three retiring members of the School Board were re-elected, ex-Mayor Plante heading the poll with

710 votes, Mrs. Skinner receiving 522, and Mr. Jno Shaw 511. The electors voted in favor of the Wednesday Half Holiday in no uncertain manner, the vote being 796 for Wednesday, and 276 for Saturday, and the ratepayers showed their approval of the purchase by the city of the Athletic Club property by a vote of 594 to 264.

A total of 1144 votes were cast, and owing to the number of ballots returned Officer Peto and his staff had a strenuous time, especially during the closing hour of the poll when an eleventh hour rush took place and it was fully an hour after the doors were closed before all the voters indoors had cast their ballots.

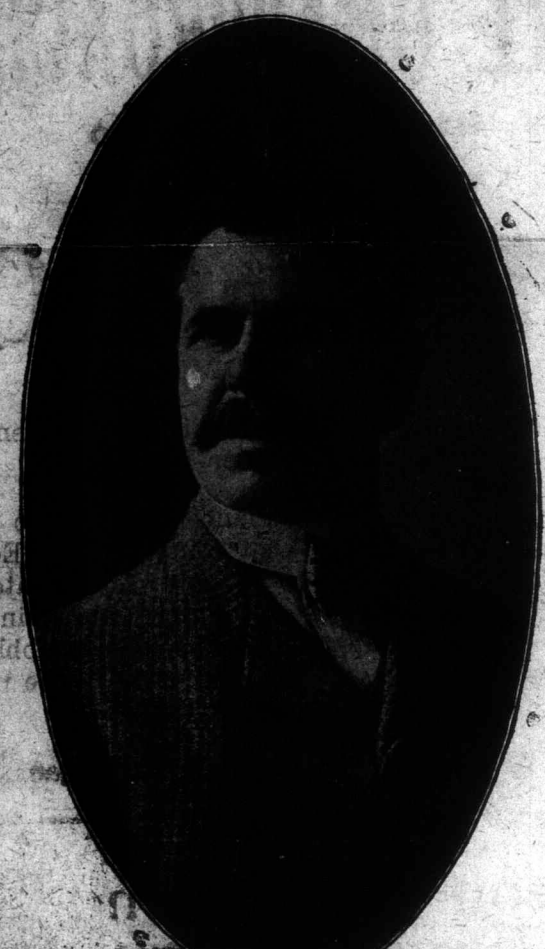

BRITISH ENTER HUN TRENCHES

German Trenches on a Front of Three Quarters of a Mile Were Captured and Consolidated.

London, Jan. 11.—A number of minor enterprises were undertaken last night, says the British official communication issued tonight, with excellent results.

South of the Ancre we entered enemy trenches at two places in the neighborhood of Grandcourt and took prisoners. Early Thursday morning local operations on a large scale northeast of Beaumont Hamel were completely successful. Our troops carried an enemy trench on a front of three quarters of a mile and established our position. An enemy counter attack this afternoon was caught in the open by our artillery and broken up with loss. 175 prisoners including 4 officers were taken in the course of operations in this area.

Enemy trenches also were raided last night east of Arrmentieres and northeast of Ypres. Many casualties were inflicted on the enemy. Artillery activity has been marked in the area north of Beauchampes and in the neighborhood of Lesars and Beaucourt and Fergueville.

Victoria, Jan. 11.—Ald. Todd was elected Mayor of Victoria today by a majority of 55 over Ald. Porter.

ARE ADVOCATING VICTORY LOAN

Three Former Chancellors of Exchequer Will Make Speeches for Victory Loan.

London, Jan. 11.—Britain is hoping Premier Lloyd George will reveal some of the proceedings of the recent Allied conference at Rome, when he speaks late today at the Guild Hall. The meeting, unique in that it will bring on the same platform as speakers in favor of Great Britain's new "victory loan," three men who have held the post of chancellor of the exchequer, will be Lloyd George's first appearance since his address in the House of Commons.

The greatest interest has been manifested in the Rome conference. Little information beyond expressions of satisfaction at the cordial spirit of co-operation developed there between all nations of the Entente has been made public, save that the conference was a momentous one. It would be characteristic of Lloyd George if he seized upon today's occasion to kindle enthusiasm for the "win the war loan" by revealing some details of the conference.

Public opinion was also interested today in the list of speakers at the Guildhall meeting as evidencing the complete harmony of political elements in Britain's "win the war" campaign. It is unprecedented that three such diverse elements as Lloyd George, Andrew Bonar Law and Reginald McKenna, all chancellors of the exchequer at one time or other, should be united, as they will be this afternoon in advocacy of a measure. McKenna was chancellor in the days of the Asquith regime, having succeeded Lloyd George in that post. Bonar Law is the present chancellor.

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The Guildhall meeting will be the first of a series of such gatherings planned in every large city and town in the United Kingdom, to be followed by systematic house-to-house canvass of citizens.

ALLIES ACTIVE IN MACEDONIA

Heavy Artillery Fighting in Progress to the South of the Struma—British Troops in Successful Raid near Lake Dolran.

Paris, Jan. 11.—Operations in Macedonia were reported upon as follows in the French war office communication issued tonight:

"Army of the East—Artillery fighting continued along the whole front, especially to the south of the Struma, in the region of Makovo and Monastir. Our reply was very effective."

"On January 6, British troops carried out a raid on Antindjalo, east of Lake Dolran, and brought back prisoners. Yesterday there were patrol encounters south of Sere."

"A British hydroplane bombarded Gorevitch, southeast of Xanthi. Twelve British aeroplanes effectively bombarded military establishments at Hudovo and Strumitza. French air squadron, composed of eight machines, bombarded important camps in the direction of Veles."

TURKS SUFFER HEAVY DEFEAT

London, Jan. 11.—An official communication issued tonight dealing with the campaign in Mesopotamia, says:

"In the morning of the tenth, during foggy weather, our troops continued their operations on the right bank of the Tigris. They made steady progress throughout the day and by nightfall a greater part of the Turkish trenches on the right bank of the river in a loop northeast of Kut-el-Amara, were captured. The prisoners taken yesterday now total 178, including seven officers. In one communication trench three hundred yards long, 200 Turkish dead were counted. Elsewhere the casualties are reported to have been numerous."

(b) Life Members shall contribute Twenty-Five Dollars to the funds of the Society.

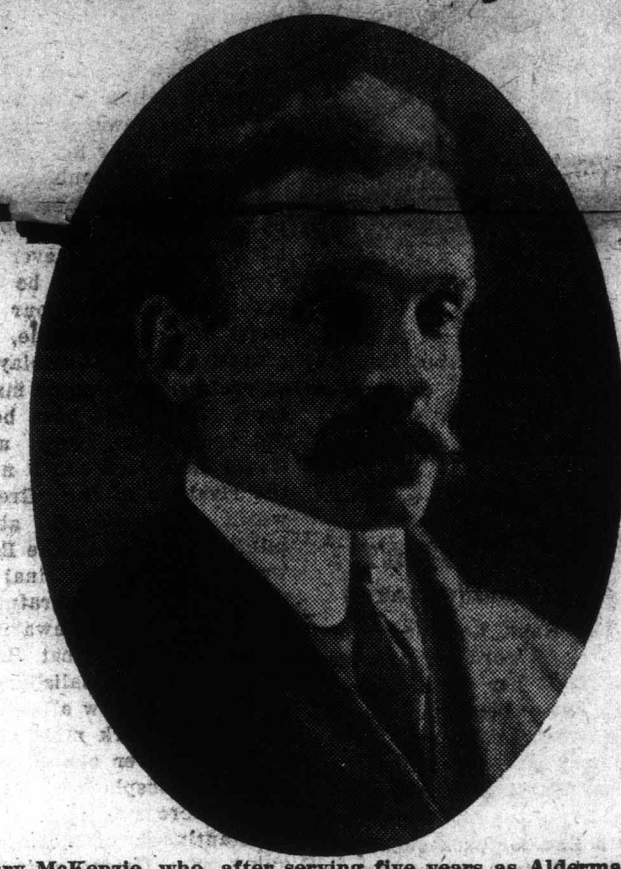
(c) Associates shall subscribe and pay annually the sum of One Dollar to the funds of the Society.

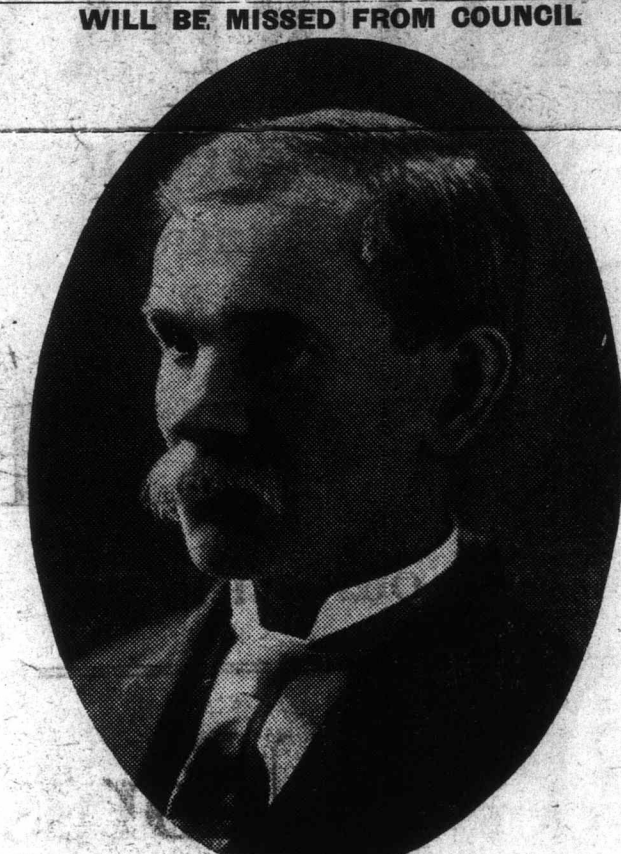
