

U. S. SCIENTISTS TO EXPLORE ECUADOR

Will Traverse the Ground Covered by Roosevelt in Amazon Basin

(Canadian Press by Leased Wire.)
New York, Oct. 29.—A large party of scientists from the United States next January will explore about 1,000 miles of almost unknown territory in the Amazon basin along Eastern Ecuador and Peru. It is announced at Columbia University. The ground to be covered includes a portion traversed by the Roosevelt expedition along the Madeira river.

Among the members of the expedition, which will take an entire year, will be Henry H. Rusby, dean of Columbia School of Pharmacy, who will head the party. Dr. David Starr Jordan, president of Leland Stanford University, who with Dr. Carl H. Eigenmann, dean of the University of Indiana, will study fishes and reptiles; Dr. F. Kromers, University of Wisconsin, an authority on volatile oils; Professor Gill, Boston Institute of Technology; Dr. Rutman, University of Michigan, and many zoologists from the American Museum of Natural History. Harvard and Johns Hopkins University are also co-operating in the expedition for a study of drugs as to physical, chemical and clinical properties.

Dr. Rusby, who headed a similar South American expedition in 1885, said he learned from natives of narcotics in the section and he hopes to find specimens for valuable medicines. The expedition will be known as the Mulford Biological Expedition of the Amazon Basin, he said.

The start will be made from Bogota by mule to Calcuta, thence by canoe down the Jaures river and the Rio Negro. After reaching the Amazon, the second half of the journey will be begun July 1 up the Madeira. The party plans to avoid the difficult high land encountered by the Roosevelt expedition by going up the Manure river. The Pacific coast is expected to be reached at the end of the year.

Chicago, Oct. 30.—Carl Wanderer found guilty of murder of wife and a man whom he had induced to act the part of a robber, was sentenced yesterday to 25 years in prison.

Home Rule Bill in House.
London, Oct. 30.—The Irish Home Rule bill was passed through committee stage in the House of Commons yesterday without further important amendment.

British Emergency Bill.
London, Oct. 30.—The government's emergency powers bill passed the final parliamentary stages yesterday and received Royal assent. It provides for all possible contingencies that may arise out of the possible strike of the miners, railwaymen and transport workers.

Refused to Annul Marriage.
Montreal, Oct. 30.—Mr. Justice Bruneau, in the Superior Court yesterday, refused to annul a "mistake" marriage which had been declared by the Archbishop to be void and took the case on deliberation, after declaring that in his opinion mixed marriages were civilly legal.

U. S. Steamer Sunk.
Newport, R. I., Oct. 30.—The concrete steamer Cape Fear, a U. S. Shipping Board vessel, was sunk in the deepest part of Narragansett Bay yesterday by the Savannah line ship of Atlanta and at a late hour nineteen of the crew of 34 were unaccounted for.

French Miners to Strike.
Charleroi, Belgium, Oct. 30.—Fifty thousand miners will strike in this region Monday in consequence of the Coal Owners' Association rejecting a demand for a five francs daily increase in wages. The government announces it will prohibit export of coal.

Civil Service and Unionism.
Ottawa, Oct. 30.—By a majority of 812 votes in a total vote of 5,584, the House of Commons yesterday voted in favor of the civil service association of Ottawa affiliating with labor under a charter derived from the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada.

Montreal Irish Meet.
Montreal, Oct. 30.—At mass memorial meeting last night in honor of late Lord Mayor MacSwiney, Mayor Martin presided and two resolutions were passed, one of condolence with Mrs. Muriel MacSwiney, widow of the Lord Mayor, and the other dealing generally with Ireland, which was ordered sent to Premier Lloyd-George, Sir Hamar Greenwood, Premier Melgoun and others.

Ultimatum to Hungary.
Paris, Oct. 30.—The Allies have sent a note to the Hungarian government demanding ratification of the treaty of Trianon not later than Nov. 15th.

ALCOHOL OUTPUT PACIFIC ISLANDS

London, Oct. 29.—There is enough raw material for the manufacture of 50,000,000 gallons of power alcohol yearly in the Pacific Islands, particularly Fiji, and with that from British East Africa and Kenya Colony the total requirements of the world could be met, says the Autocar.

The three raw materials contemplated are maize, cassava and sugar cane, and it is estimated that the cost of these crops would be such as to enable the raw material for a gallon of power alcohol to be available at 12 cents.

The periodical estimates that after paying the cost of transportation the fuel could be marketed over here at the equivalent of 62 cents per gallon.

U. S. ELECTIONS WATCHED BY WORLD

identical term, but this has no application to the presidential election.

Previous Presidential Elections.
The 1920 presidential election in the United States will be the 34th in the history of the republic. Former elections resulted as follows:

1789—Previous to 1804 each elector voted for two candidates for President. The one who received the largest number of votes was declared President and the one who received the next largest number of votes was declared Vice President. George Washington was declared President and John Adams, Vice President.

1792—George Washington, President; John Adams, Vice President.

1796—John Adams, President; Thomas Jefferson, Vice President.

1800—There being a tie between Thomas Jefferson, Republican, and Aaron Burr, Republican, the choice devolved upon the House of Representatives. Jefferson received the vote of ten states which be-

ing the largest vote cast for a candidate, elected him President. Burr received the votes of four states which, being the next largest vote, elected him Vice President. There were two blank votes.

1804.—The Constitution of the United States having been amended, the electors at this election voted for a President and a Vice President, instead of for two candidates for President. Thomas Jefferson, Republican, President; George Clinton, Republican, Vice President.

1808.—James Madison, Republican, President; George Clinton, Republican, Vice President.

1812.—James Madison, Republican, President; Elbridge Gerry, Republican, Vice President.

1816.—James Monroe, Republican, President; Daniel D. Tompkins, Republican, Vice President.

1820.—James Monroe, President; Daniel D. Tompkins, Vice President.

1824.—There was no choice in the electoral college in 1824 for President, and the election was thrown into the House of Representatives, which chose John Quincy Adams for President; John C. Calhoun, Republican, Vice President.

1828.—Andrew Jackson, Democrat, President; John C. Calhoun, Democrat, Vice President.

1832.—Andrew Jackson, Democrat, President; Martin Van Buren, Democrat, Vice President.
