A Severe Blizzard Swept Eastern Canada and the New England States on Sunday

Heavy Snowfalls in Many Districts—Communication Interfered With.

Montreal, Oct. 11.—The eastern provinces of the Dominion were storm-swept on Saturday, blizzards raging over the northern sections of New Brunswick and in the valley of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Snow, the earliest fall recorded in very many years, fell in Montreal and the path of the storm extended eastward, apparently attaining its peak along the borders of Quebec and New Brunswick. Quebec City experienced only a light fall but south and east of the city, particularly in the counties of Beauce and Dorchester, the fall amounted to several inches.

While there have been no reports of much material damage, havoc was wrought with communication. The two Canadian telephone companies were deprived of the means of conducting business between Montreal and eastern points for several hours, poles having been blown down and lines broken. Between Gaspe and the New Brunswick line severe blizzards were experienced, 16 inches of snow having fallen between Newcastle and Bathurst.

The storm appears to have been the extension of the gales that swept the New England coast over the week-end, resulting in severe losses to shipping.

Many Vessels Disabled.
Boston, Oct. 11.—The storm that lashed the Atlantic seaboard last night and yesterday disabled or distressed five craft it was revealed in radio messages received here to-day. Four were coastwise patrol boats operating in New England waters. The fifth was the Danish tanker Broun, reported early to-day in distress on Newport News, Virginia.

The coastal guard patrol boats 128, 238, 147 and 126. The first two operating out of Narragansett and Boston respectively, and the latter two out of New London were caught in the 70 mile gale. To-night the crew of 60 of the 128 had been rescued by the Cunarder Cameronia, the 238 was still adrift without fuel off Cape Cod, and the 147 was reported to have been picked up by the cutter Mohaw, which was towing her back to her base.

Since early morning nothing has been heard from the Broun. At that time the steamer American of the American-Hawaiian line was reported standing by. Later, a fragment of a message which read "We are towing her to Nam," was picked up, but the sender and the station addresses were lost. "Nam" is the radio call for Norfolk, Va.

Possibility that a fifth vessel might be in distress was revealed when another incomplete message was intercepted, stating that a steamer was aground at "Old Point, Prov." The sender station address and the remainder of that name were not picked up.

Played Havoc on C. N. R.
Moncton, Oct. 11.—The winter weather which has been sweeping over the western part of Canada and the United States struck the northern part of New Brunswick last night with great violence, with the result that all wire service has been seriously interrupted and record snowfalls for the time of year have occurred at various points on the northern part of the Atlantic region.

At Red Pine, between Newcastle and Bathurst, snow fell to the depth of 16 inches and the snowfall area extended east to the Atlantic region as far as Harcourt. Railway officials report a snowfall of two and a half feet at Podous, near Rimouski.

The storm played havoc with the telegraphic wires north of Moncton. Between Gloucester Junction and New Mills 30 telegraph poles were broken down and 20 more at another part of the Atlantic region near Campbellton. In consequence of the damage wrought by the storm to the Canadian National Railway Telegraph service, train movement on the Northern Division was greatly hampered and very slow.

To-day's Ocean Limited from Montreal was delayed 50 minutes by the snow between Moncton and Campbellton.

In Moncton a 45 miles an hour gale prevailed to-day, but no damage is reported. Very heavy rain storm prevailed in this section Saturday afternoon and night with occasional snow flurries to-day. Snow fell in sections of Albert county, where the mountains are covered with winter's mantle.

COLD CURE SOUGHT.
Drive to Find Remedy is Planned at Holland Health Laboratory.

Amsterdam, Holland, Oct. 11.—The scourge of humanity, the common cold is going to be subjected to an exhaustive investigation by the public health laboratory at the University of Amsterdam with the object of discovering a definite preventive of cure.

This work, which is planned on big lines, is expected to last until mid-summer next year, and the services of no fewer than 8,000 collaborators spread throughout the whole country has been obtained.

BROTHERS INJURED.
Shediac, Oct. 11.—George Hanington and his brother, John M., who operate a gasoline lumber mill in the Moncton Road, four miles from Shediac, were seriously injured several days ago when a stick flew from a saw and hit their heads. Their wounds were given treatment and they are progressing favorably.

Telephone and Telegraph Poles Down by Hundreds

Houlton, Me., Oct. 11.—Every available telephone and telegraph line has been cut off today resulting in complete isolation of the heavy storm of last night which for a time crippled many sections of the Bangor & Aroostook Railroad, wires and made much havoc with the telephone lines. The storm seems to have been heavy between Oakfield and Houlton and this morning it was reported that 225 telephone poles were down in a 12-mile stretch north of Ludlow, many of them carrying cables. While temporary lines will be working soon, it will be a week or more before the damage is repaired, it is said.

MADAM HAD WORST STORM OF YEARS

Trees Uprooted and the Chimney of One House Came Down.

McAdam, Oct. 11.—The worst storm in years visited McAdam last night. After 24 hours' rain snow began falling, and then about 3 p. m. Saturday a howling wind from the north sprang up. After an all night storm one would hardly recognize the place. Trees were broken and the limbs scattered. The chimney of one house was down as a result of the high wind. Although the storm has abated real winter weather has set in. About two inches of snow fell during the storm, most of it still remaining on the ground.

New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest.
The 250 hens in the New Brunswick egg laying contest which is conducted at the Experimental Station, Fredericton, laid 577 eggs during the week, which brings the total to date since November 1st up to 36,733 eggs. The pens owned by A. T. Reed, Hollingdale and George Manchester, Fredericton, led in production with 38 eggs each. The pen owned by F. H. Ferguson, Fredericton, was in second position with 37 eggs. The pen owned by A. T. Reed still continues to lead in total production with 2,136 eggs. Second position is held by A. S. Stevens' pen with 2,117 eggs. The two leading hens are owned by Mr. Stevens with records of 287 and 286 eggs respectively.

MRS. GALLOP TAKES ARREST UNMOVED

Had Will in Her Possession Which Was Unsigned by Husband.

Moncton, Oct. 11.—The arrest of Mrs. Abraham Gallop in Sunny Brae Friday afternoon, charged with poisoning her husband at Aylmerville, Quebec, came as a great shock to many people here. During the war when she was living at Napadogan, Mrs. Gallop was deeply interested in Red Cross work. It is reported that without any solicitation on the part of the order she raised several hundred dollars and forwarded it to the Red Cross in Moncton.

Mrs. Gallop seemed unmoved by her arrest but expressed great surprise at the charge. She was able to eat a hearty meal at the police station and was quite cheerful. In her possession was found a will purporting to be that of her late husband, but unsigned by him, although it was signed by two witnesses, including the mother of the accused.

The will was as follows:
April 23, 1923, Napadogan, York Co., N. B. "I, Abraham Gallop, give and bequeath my houses and buildings to my wife, Amy C. Gallop, and allow her all my personal belongings to do unconditionally as she wishes. Witness by J. A. Langlois, Mrs. Thomas J. Sprague."
