The Local Legislature.

Fredricton, March 21.—Mr. Powell

follows Mr. Mitchell. He said the fact

that the provincial secretary had admit-

ted a deficit might be regarded as a

small shadow of things to come. Mr.

Mitchell had attempted to justify the

several items of over expenditure, but

he (Powell) was astonished that no

justification was attempted of the large

over expenditures of money that had

not been authorized by this legislature,

when there was a law which required

that when such over expenditures were

made particulars of them should have

been laid before the house within three

days after the opening of the session.

The secretary had attempted to explain

away certain things in connection with

the chief commissioner's office, particu-

larly with respect to the expenditure of

byrands, and perhaps he would be able

to explain how it was that while over

\$16,000 was estimated for public build-

ings and so charged in the auditor gen-

eral's report, the details of the expendi-

ture amounted to little more than \$9,000.

Those who heard the secretary last year

announce his estimates, and who had

heard him again today, must have been

astonished at how unreliable these

estimates have turned out to be.

When he (Powell) made the prophecy

last year that the deficit for 1893 would

be not less than \$42,000 he had stated

that he based his prediction on the state-

ment of the provincial secretary that the

lands sale would yield additional

revenue \$40,000. There sales had realized

over \$69,000 additional revenue, and

cutting down this deficit estimated
