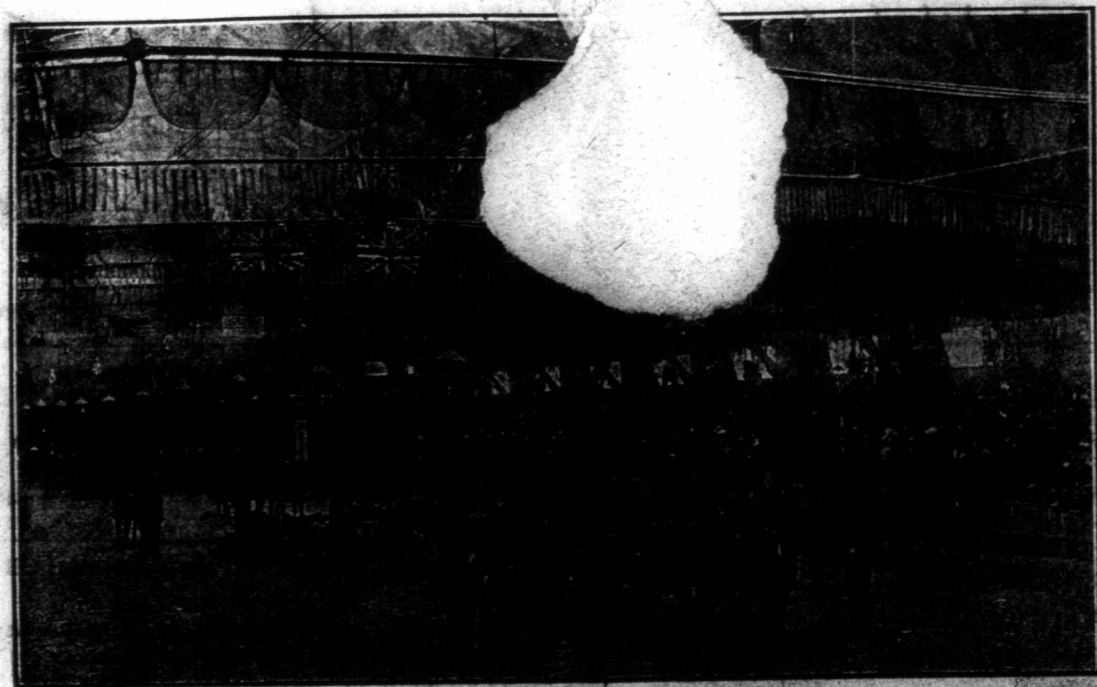




forthcoming Calgary Industrial Exhibition Greater Than Ever

Recognizing the necessity of keeping the standard on a steadily increasing scale of merit the management of the Calgary fair has for this year secured what is confidently expected will prove the most entertaining program of free attractions which has ever been secured for this city. These will all be presented in the afternoons and evenings and in conjunction with the racing program, should provide splendid amusement for the fair visitors.

Readers of the Western Standard in a previous issue have learned something about the wonders that may be expected from Miss Katherine Stinson, the young aviator, who has created a sensation in the United States from coast to coast. Her appearance at Calgary will be the first time she has appeared on this side of the line, though she is not by any means a stranger to some Canadians, as she has trained many of our aviators for service at the front at her aviation school in Texas.

Her latest request is that she be granted permission to make a flight over the Sarcee military camp, and an effort will be made to have the military authorities accede to her request. It would be an interesting sensation for the boys from all over the province who are assembled in the big train grounds to see hovering over them like a flock in the blue of the sky a scouting aeroplane.

While the extreme height of season-

alism will be reached by Miss Stinson, there are a number of other attractions which would be top liners on any amusement bill.

In the circus world the name of Robinson has been indissolubly associated with performances under the big tops, and Robinson's trained elephants are to be one of the features of the exhibition this year. They are a group of splendidly trained animals which have held the approval and appreciation of audiences in the biggest cities.

The particular brand of humor in nearly all of us which is appealed to by the spectacle of someone getting the slapstick applied where it will be the most effective has been tickled in previous years by the antics of Mrs. "Happy" Harrison's kicking mule. This long-eared outlay will be here again this year, but accompanying him are a number of other animals just as efficiently trained for their amusement creating ability.

A complete change is afforded by the performance of the group of celebrated acrobats who are known as The Mangans. They are extremely versatile, in their accomplishments and in three complete and entirely different turns. In each they have won the warmest approval, and as this is their first appearance in Calgary, they may be depended on to give their best.

Three accomplished roller skaters and dancers who appear in the Helen Carlos Trio will give something new in

this line. Miss Carlos and the two men who appear with her have an act that has been very highly spoken of wherever they have appeared.

There is no piece of apparatus which is better adapted for clowning and skill than the horizontal bar, and The Campbells are a company of five exceptionally clever performers who have taken this method of presenting their act in which all the possibilities of their ability are given full scope.

A thrilling act is presented by "Polar," who climbs a slender pole 55 feet in height and from the top of it gives a performance which is a decided novelty and one of the most sensational of its kind.

These are the big imported acts which have been secured from the big vaudeville circuits, but there are some local events which will add to the interest. Many children from the Calgary public schools are being trained by Miss Lewis, the physical director, in drills, dances and exercises, which will show the pupils in a very attractive addition to the program.

The boys from Columbus Club Gymnasium who have succeeded in mastering many of the feats of the professionals which they perform with all the enthusiasm, grace and skill of the red-blooded western youngsters will be another attraction in the evenings.

These are some of the free attractions which are provided for this year's exhibition and unless everybody is mistaken there will be no room left for criticism over this portion of the entertainment.

gical information respecting the formations. After they had gone through the well house, had viewed the oil in the tanks through the orifices in the coverings, and had watched, as if hypnotized, the steady flow of golden green oil from the well pipe, the Calgaryans had a shrewd appetite for a barbecue with real buffalo as the piece de resistance. On a long table set up outside the men's living quarters, was spread out an appetizing array of viands and the guests carried their plates to the carver and received a generous helping of juicy and luscious bison.

First Taste of Buffalo Meat

It was for the most of the visitors the first taste they had ever had of buffalo and for the majority it will probably be the last, for buffalo is not slaughtered by the government in any great quantity. But the meat was all that had been claimed for it, and to boot, it was well cooked, nicely served and was accompanied by toothsome comestibles that touched the spot.
