was in 30 years previously. Much of the revenue which the Whit ney Government spends so freely comes as easily as it goes. For instance, the interest, paid last year \$2,128,772, seven andred and ninety thousand dollars o that amount being the increase in the subsidy granted last year. That is a sum to be poured into Whitney's lap. It is almost half as much as cost the Province for government be-fore Whitney attained office. Then lands, forests and mines (which Col. Matheson used to declare was a de vouring of capital) was derived \$3,068. 000. Succession duties, which the Prem ier stands on record as declaring to be "robbery" and "outrage," yielded \$600. 000, while the corporation taxes, which he denounced and promised to repeal, should he attain power, brought \$670, 000, while \$550,000 came from tavern brewers' licenses. It must be said that Ontario is happily situated for revenue; but it is bardly the part of wisdom to needlessly increase our expenditure by millions, just because the money is obtainable at the moment, leaving a big new capital account—a Provincial debt-amounting to \$14,986,566 to take care of itself. The time will come when revenue may not flow in so abundantly and cautious statesmanship would pro vide against that day. Ontario's T. & N. O. R. is put down at something over \$1,500,000 as an asset; and it yields a small revenue already, over operating expenses. Like most government-owned ads, however, it is hardly likely to vield dividends on the capital invested for some time to come, at least, not such dividends as come directly. The road has been very fortunate in opening up a great new mineral region, and en arging the northern field of settlement and, in that way, has proved of great

value to the Province. 
