Electric Roads in Sweden.
Within the near future definite plans will be formulated for the electrification of the more important state railways of Sweden. The first line to be taken in hand will be, in all probability, that between Kiruna, the centre of the great iron ore fields of Lapland, and Riksgransen, on the Norwegian frontier, a distance of about eighty-one miles.

The adoption of electric traction on this line, far above the arctic circle and the most northern railway in the world, will be an event of considerable importance in the history of electricity, and cannot fail to stimulate in marked degree the demand for similar action in
