Going To Explore Newfoundland.

English Professors Expect to Devote Two Years to the Work.

Profs. Worthman Allen and John Melbourne of London sailed yesterday for St. John's by the Red Cross liner Bornu to make a thorough exploration of the interior of Newfoundland. Prof. Allen said that although Newfoundland was the oldest English colony it was practically uninhabited in the interior. The two professors will work until the cold weather sets in and will then return to England, going back to Newfoundland in the spring to continue the work, which they believe will be completed in about two years. They will be assisted by Prof. Henry MacHenry of London, who is waiting for them at St. John's.—New York Sun, Aug. 21.

Annual Fishery Report

Mr. Goodridge, the Deputy Minister of Fisheries, in his report to his chief, Mr. Piccott, notes that the value of the fisheries exported in 1909 showed a decrease of \$452,104 compared with 1908. He also observes the increased quantity of fish sent away in casks, which has been growing during the past five years. About this he remarks: "There can be no doubt as to the advantage of the system, both to the shipper, who, sending by steamer or through bill of lading can estimate closely the time of arrival in the market, thus avoiding delay and deterioration, and to the buyer who receives the fish in better condition than the ordinary bulk cargo, gets full weight, besides escaping the broken, stained and damaged fish, cullage and loss in weight and handling so prevalent in bulk cargoes."

He also notes the increase in the shipment of small shipments of fish the consignee paying cash against document.

As to the destinations of the 1,800,000 qtls. of fish exported, the Mediterranean took nearly a million quintals. The Deputy reviews these shipments in these words: "Considering the amount of these shipments, which was abnormally large, the realization of this quantity of fish has been fairly successful as a whole, but much money has been lost on bulk cargoes, chiefly through injudicious shipping and the congestion resulting from over-eagerness on the part of shippers in rushing cargoes to market."

In connection with this market, we understand Mr. R. Grieve, who left by the last Allan steamer for England, intends to spend some time in the Mediterranean market, with a view of obtaining first hand information as to conditions actually prevailing there.

The Deputy reports that Brazil took 380,000 quintals, but owing to crop failure and depressed financial condition, the prices were poor for the first ten months. Better returns were realized for remainder of season.

SAILED FOR WRECK.—The D. P. Ingraham left here at 4 p.m. yesterday for the scene of the wreck of the whaler Cachet at the eastern end of the Straits of Belle Isle. Mr. D. A. Ryan went by her and will superintend the work of salvaging gear, machinery, etc., connected with the ship.

FIVE PRISONERS ARRESTED.—There was a good deal of drunkenness evident on the streets last evening and night, and four disorderlies and one drunk were jailed by the police.

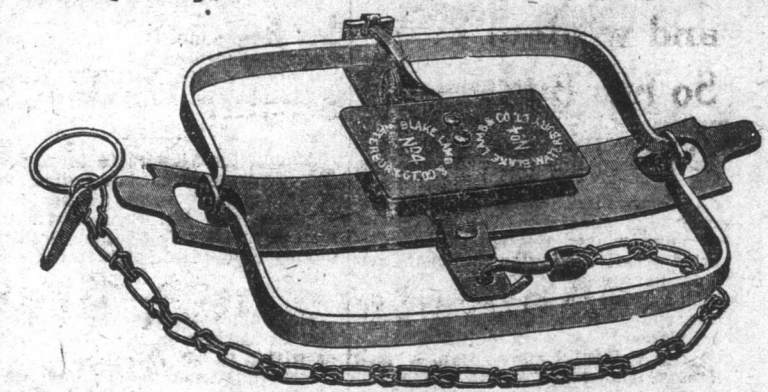
