### Cable News.

**Berlin, March 6.**  
The Taegliche Rundschau announces that a cruiser fleet of six ships and four Dreadnoughts will be transferred in April from Kiel to Wilhelmshaff, and will be permanently stationed in the North Sea. The journal explains that the transfer has nothing to do with Anglo-German relations, declaring that Germany is only following Britain's lead in concentrating her naval strength in those waters, under the assumption that in the wars of the future the most important decisions will fall in the North Sea.

**Tokio, March 6.**  
Special Evening Telegram. Influential personages here consider that the powerlessness of Yuan Shi Kai or any other official to cope with the present situation has been fully demonstrated. It is believed that the only solution is placing China under an international financial protectorate, and advancing the funds necessary to pay off the soldiers and effect the necessary reforms. It is feared that if left unaided, China will long remain the scene of disturbances and that heavy sacrifices of life and property must result.

**Tripoli, March 6.**  
Special to Evening Telegram. For the first time in history a big dirigible balloon has been used for scouting purposes by the Italian Army in active war. An airship floated far out over the desert, and the aviators were able to get a good view of the Arab positions. When the dirigible left the camp, the warships in the harbor fired a salute. A second airship, working in unison, sailed over the enemy's camp, dropping bombs en route.

**Washington, March 6.**  
Special Evening Telegram. Regarding the conditions in North China, Minister Calhoun reports that British missionaries in Che Lee province have been massacred. He adds that while no immediate danger threatens Peking, more troops will be needed at Tien Tsin, where foreign troops are assisting Chinese officials to preserve order. The foreign military occupation of the Pekin-Tien Tsin railway may be necessary.

**Tien Tsin, March 6.**  
Special to Evening Telegram. From tomorrow British consuls here will be placed under martial law. No Chinese will be allowed on the streets after 11 p.m. All foreigners are warned to reply promptly to the challenge of the patrols.

**New York, March 6.**  
Special to Evening Telegram. The Produce Exchange has launched a campaign with the object of stirring the State Department into immediate action to prevent the enactment of the proposed reciprocal trade agreement between Canada and the British West Indies.

**London, March 6.**  
Special to Evening Telegram. A tremendous gale raged yesterday in the British Channel. All wireless communication between England and the Continent were cut off.

#### THE PIANO.

### Dictagraph in Evidence.

Government Had Machine in Ironworkers' Headquarters to Record Conversations.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 18.—Ortie E. McManigal, the confessed dynamiter, will not be arraigned here with the other defendants on March 12, but will be brought here during the trials probably in May. It is not stated when McManigal will be arraigned.  
The arrest of J. W. Irwin, in Chicago, to-day, puts the government in possession of all but two of the 54 men indicted. The defendants who had not been apprehended are John J. McCarry, formerly an iron worker in Wheeling, W. Va., and Patrick Ryan, formerly a business agent in Chicago.

Irwin is named in his indictment as having been recording secretary and treasurer of a local union at Peoria, Ill., in 1908 and 1909. McManigal confessed he blew up several places in and near Peoria after that time. One of these was an explosion in September, 1910, when six buildings were damaged and a night watchman was injured.

The fact that for days the government has had a dictagraph in the office of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers here and has taken reports of conversations of President Frank Ryan and others in connection with the dynamite conspiracy, became known yesterday.

Government agents yesterday afternoon after hearing that the iron workers officials were aware of the dictagraph, entered Ryan's office and took out the instrument which had been attached to the end of a drawer at his desk. Ryan declared he was not aware that his conversations were being overheard.

Assistant District Attorney Clarence Nicholas admitted that the instrument had been in Ryan's office for weeks and that it had been placed there by government agents at night.

### Mansard's Roof.

The great hall of the Hotel de Ville of Paris, designed by Mansard, is the wonder and admiration of every one who has seen it on account of the groined roof.

Mansard threw himself at the feet of the king and said: "Your majesty sees in the centre that massive column? If you will spare the life of my son I will remove the unsightly pillar, and the roof shall stand without support." "Mansard," replied the king, "if you accomplish that miracle I will pardon your son, but if you fail I will hang you with him."

The architect removed the pillar without great difficulty and with the result desired. The café-terrace is a philosopher, and he concludes his story with the reflection that had not Mansard's son been a scamp the hall at Arles would be just like any other hall.—London Globe.

### Elephant Seal.

One of the noteworthy results of a recent expedition on the government steamer "Albatross," was the discovery of a band of elephant seals. The expedition was commanded by Dr. Chas. H. Townsend, Director of the New York Aquarium, and was sent out under the auspices of the New York Zoological Society and the Museum of Natural History, New York. The animals were found on the uninhabited island of Gaudeloupe, 250 miles off the coast of San Diego. The party captured alive six baby elephant seals, which were sent to the New York Aquarium, where they are attracting great attention. Four skins of large adult males were obtained, over sixteen feet long, for a museum group. The maximum length of the adult male is 22 feet. The female, which is smaller, lacks a proboscis. The short proboscis, or "trunk," has the nostril openings at the end and can be expanded and contracted at will. The male elephant seals fight desperately, as the scars on their necks and breasts bear evidence. They have formidable teeth and send forth guttural roars which can be heard at a considerable distance. Unlike the fur seal the elephant seal is a wonderful producing animal, having a deep layer of blubber six or seven inches thick; the oil is even superior to whale oil.

Forty years ago elephant seals were abundant, but owing to their wholesale slaughter to obtain the valuable oil for commercial purposes by the sealers, the species is now approaching extinction.

**NORTHERN COAST BLOCKED.**—Bonavista reported yesterday that heavy ice was packed close on the land at that place and also to the northward. A continuous and strong off-shore wind is badly needed to clear the floe off the land before a ship can get north.
