Diocesan Synod.

JULY 13, 1916.
Pursuant to adjournment, the House met at 3.30 p.m., the Lord Bishop presiding. After prayers the rolls were called when 32 clergy and 16 lay delegates answered to their names.
Minutes of previous session read, confirmed and signed by the Bishop.
The Bishop appointed the following Committees which were approved of by the Synod.

Rev. H. Facey desired information

relative to Bishop Spencer College. Mr. Blackall laid upon the table the information required.
The adjourned debate on Education was then resumed by Mr. Blackall, who introduced certain Resolutions explaining the Report. After some discussion, the Rev. A. G. Bayly suggested an addition to the Resolutions which was accepted by the Committee and the Report finally adopted.
The Rev. T. E. Loder's question regarding Ecclesiastical Boundaries was answered by the Rev. Canon Bolt.
Mr. Blackall's motion arising out of the correspondence with the Canadian Church, referred to in the Bishop's Charge, caused some discussion. It was decided that the whole matter be dealt with by the Executive Committee of the Synod and any others whom the Bishop might nominate.
The Bishop announced that His Excellency the Governor would visit the Synod during the Evening Session. House rose at 6.15.

EVENING SESSION.

The House resumed at 7.30, the Lord Bishop presiding. After prayers 20 clergy and 33 lay delegates answered to their names.
Mr. Blackall again introduced the subject of Spencer Lodge, and submitted a Resolution proposing the whole question be referred to the Executive Committee. Mr. Brian Dunfield seconded the motion which upon being put was carried.
Sir W. H. Horwood moved a vote of thanks to the Bishop for the dignity, courtesy and discretion with which he has presided over this Session of the Synod. Carried by acclamation.
Votes of thanks were also passed to His Excellency the Governor, to the clerical and lay secretaries for their work, to the daily press for publishing the proceedings of the Synod, to the reporters for preparing a synopsis of the proceedings for the daily press, to the ladies for hospitality extended, to the Postal and telephone departments for placing a box and telephone in the building for the convenience of the members, to the various S.S. Companies for favors extended, to the hospitality committee for looking after the comforts of the outport clergy.
The minutes of the session were read, passed and signed by the Bishop. The Doxology was sung, and the Benediction pronounced, and after singing the National Anthem, the Twenty-second Biennial Session progressed at 9.45.

At 10 o'clock His Excellency the Governor was announced and escorted to the chair by the clerical and lay secretaries, the Synod rising and singing the National Anthem. After being introduced by the Bishop, His Excellency prefaced his remarks by expressing the great pleasure it gave him of meeting the Synod in Session assembled, and in a brief but intensely patriotic address graphically described the war in all its phases from a military and naval standpoint. The conclusion of his address, the Bishop in cheate and eloquent language thanked the Governor for the treat afforded them, which was vociferously applauded by the Synod. The National Anthem was again sung and His Excellency retired.

Presentation to Rev. P. J. O'Brien

On Friday evening last representatives of the several sections of Tor's Cove parish, including the Holy Name Society, the Altar Society and League of the Sacred Heart, met at the Sanctuary and presented the Rev. P. J. O'Brien with the following address and valuable purse.

ADDRESS

To Rev. P. J. O'Brien, P. P.

Rev. Dear Father,—

It is with heavy hearts we gather here to-night to bid you farewell. 'Tis only now we realize, with deep regret, you must leave us and take up your cross in a more prominent parish with more financial aid to display your architectural ideas. With us the past fifteen years, the prime of your life, you leave us well supplied with churches and public buildings, which but a short time more would have seen the ornamentation of your building program completed.

On our memory will ever be impressed your great devotion and attention in Spiritual matters to those in need. You were a constant visitor to the sick, never taking distance or weather in consideration.

In your leaving us our prayers go with you that God might give you physical strength and Spiritual aid in your new parish.

We would conclude by wishing you a number of years to continue God's work, and three score and ten find you feeling as energetic as to-day. We beg of you to accept herewith a small purse of gold as a token of our regard, regretting that the time of year hinders us from doing better.

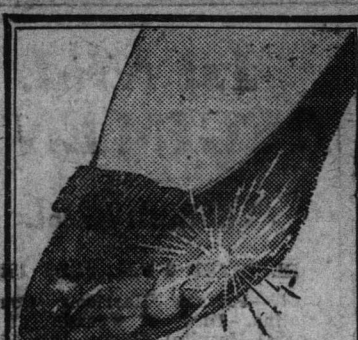

Rev. P. J. O'Brien's Address.

The Rev. father thanked those present very cordially on behalf of the community, referring in pathetic words to the glowing and complimentary reference made to him in the address; he said that though the 15 years of his ministry among them were years of arduous labor, the burden placed upon him was made light by the whole-hearted and generous support he always received from the people. Though many buildings of architectural design were required he never troubled about cost, because as his mission was to build up the material and spiritual edifice, including the religious, educational and social purpose, he felt that he had God's help on the one hand and the united support of the people in the other. Now that all was completed, paid for and a sum of about two thousand dollars to the credit of the parish, he knew his future work would be light, and that were he to consider his own ease he would gladly remain amongst the people of Tor's Cove Parish. But as he had been called to another field of labour he felt he should not, for any personal reasons interfere with the dispensations of Providence. "You have not chosen me but I have chosen you that you go forth and bear fruit and that your fruit should remain." He referred to the grave, responsibility now placed upon his shoulders and expressed the hope that the prayers of the good people of this parish always so efficacious, united with those of the people over whom he was now placed would bring help necessary to complete whatever God required him to do. He did not leave Tor's Cove for any advantage the future may offer, but through a sense of duty, and that the people of Tor's Cove Parish would be ever kindly and gratefully remembered by him. He said that he was especially glad that all was so prosperous, and that he believed a bright future was before the Southern Shore.

He concluded by wishing a blessing upon the people and all that concerned them. He knew that his successor, with whom he had been for many years intimately acquainted, would be zealously interested in them, and that if they gave him the same generous support he always received people and priest would be happy. All present were deeply affected, for the people felt that in the departure of Father O'Brien they not only had lost a devoted priest but a true friend.

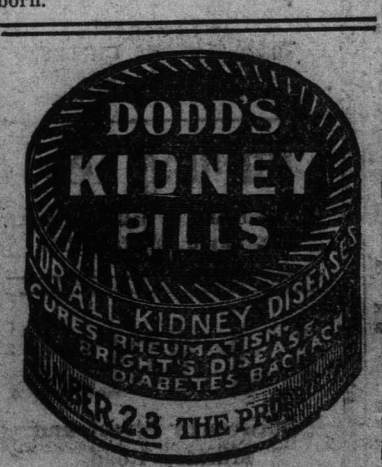
