## Allies Pursue Retreating Germans.

### TRUSTING WILSON AND FATE.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 8. George Bernhardt, the German political writer, writing for the "Vossische Zeitung," of Berlin, says that Prince Maximilian's announcement in the Reichstag that an armistice had been requested, was received in stony silence. Like ghosts, remembrances of former Chancellors' speeches flitted through the Chamber, speeches invariably based on reports of the victorious marches of German troops, he says. Bernhardt bitterly complains that Prince Maximilian neglected the opportunity to declare that Germany was ready to discuss with France the fate of Alsace Lorraine and with Russia the question of border provinces. He says, this omission confirms the view that the new Government means to perpetuate the political conceptions of the old Government, and declares that this continuation of the old policy is extraordinarily dangerous. He concludes, the Government only puts its trust in President Wilson and a kind fate.

### GREETED WITH SATISFACTION.

#### PARIS, Oct. 9.

President Wilson's reply to the German peace note was published in the noon editions of the newspapers today, and was greeted with general satisfaction and expressions of approval throughout Paris. The note could not be improved upon. "Substitute Paris for Washington, as the date line and reply might have been dictated here," is an epitome of French opinion as indicated by the popular reception of the Presidential document. Paris was on its way to luncheon when the newspapers containing the note came out, and the people literally fought for copies of the edition. The note was reproduced in these journals in heavy black type under big headlines. The significant passage in the note, in which President Wilson refuses to entertain the possibility of a cessation of hostilities and demanding the immediate withdrawal of the German troops, is interpreted in military circles as meaning that the Allies will give the Germans no respite in their retreat. Commandant Miribel, one of the best known military critics in France, expressed the view to the Associated Press correspondent in this connection, that if the Germans were harassed and pressed during the retreat to the Meuse, they

would lose a third of their effective and one-half of their material, and would find themselves comparatively as weak on the line of the Meuse as they are now. On the other hand, he declared if they were allowed to retreat to the powerfully fortified line of the Meuse with their line shortened by nearly 300 kilometres, 40 of their divisions would be available for manoeuvring. Commenting on the note the Inter-Allied says the response of President Wilson, by its sincerity and faith, cuts with single stroke the snares laid by Prince Maximilian of Baden. President Wilson responds by asking Germany "What do you mean? Do you accept my conditions? Do you speak in the name of the Government and the People?" He requires before any negotiations, that Germany evacuate the invaded territory. This is a like answer to that given the Duke of Brunswick after his defeat at Valmy.

### ALLIES IN ACCORD.

#### LONDON, Oct. 9.

The Press Association has issued an authoritative statement that the Foreign Office has received the text of President Wilson's note to Germany, and that all the Allies are in complete accord. The matter adds: "The fall of the Turkish Cabinet has great significance. It is not doubted that Turkey apprised Berlin of her intention to seek peace, and Germany sought to stave off such a development by an attempt to seek a general instead of a partial settlement."

### THE GERMAN RETREAT.

#### NEW YORK, Oct. 9.

(Associated Press.)—The German armies are in full flight before the British, American and French forces on the front between Cambrai and St. Quentin. Cambrai, the strong point of the enemy in this region, has been taken by the British in its entirety, and north of Cambrai the Canadians have deeply penetrated the German line. Out in the open east of what once was the old Hindenburg line, cavalry is hustling the retreating foe in what virtually amounts to a rout. So fast is the retreat that columns of the Allied troops in parade formation have passed through numerous villages completely cut of contact with the Germans. More than 10,000 prisoners, and between 100 and 200 guns were captured in Tuesday's fighting, and a continuation of the battle on Wednesday resulted in further large captures. In the fighting, 23 German divisions, or more than a quarter of a million men, have been severely man-handled. The maximum depth of the advance is between eight and ten miles. The Germans are declared to be fleeing to the east of Le Cateau, one of the most important railroad centers in this region. Behind them Germans are leaving the country devastated, burning towns and villages as they flee.

## COLIN CAMPBELL.

### PRaise FOR BRITISH OFFICERS.

#### LONDON, Oct. 9.

Premier Lloyd George has sent the following to Field Marshal Haig in the field: "I have just heard from Marshal Foch of the brilliant victory won by the Third and Fourth Armies, and wish to express to yourself, General Byng, General Rawlinson and all the officers and men under your command, my sincerest congratulations on the great and significant successes which the British Army with their American brothers-in-arms have gained during the past few days. The courage and tenacity which the troops of the Empire, after withstanding terrific enemy assaults in the spring of this year, again resumed the offensive with such decisive results, is the greatest chapter of our military history. The smashing of the great defensive system erected by the enemy, and claimed to be impregnable, is a feat of which all are justly proud, and for which the Empire will ever be grateful."

### GERMAN CASUALTIES HEAVY.

#### PARIS, Oct. 9.

The Hindenburg line no longer bars the path of the Allies. The definite rupture of it was achieved on the first day of the fighting in the new development towards the north of the great battle, now raging from the Meuse to the Rhine. To Anglo-Saxon forces went the honor of storming the last remnants of the extraordinary mass of defenses in some places twelve miles in depth between Cambrai and St. Quentin. Apart from this achievement the results of the day's fighting were notable in that the enemy's losses must have run into tens of thousands of men during the

day's fighting in the various sectors of the long battle front. In addition important strategic objects were attained.

### ADVANCE OF FIVE MILES.

#### PARIS, Oct. 9.

The Anglo-French troops have forced the Germans to a general retreat north and south of St. Quentin. The first army pursuing the enemy rearwards has advanced about five miles to the east of St. Quentin and taken 2,000 prisoners.

### BRITISH OFFICIAL.

#### LONDON, Oct. 9.

We inflicted a heavy defeat on the enemy yesterday between St. Quentin and Cambrai, taking over 10,000 prisoners and between 100 to 200 guns. No less than twenty-three German divisions were engaged on this front.

through the southern portions of the town. Since August 21 the British first, third and fourth armies have broken through the whole elaborate series of deep defensive zones built up with successive belts of heavily fortified trench lines including the entire Hindenburg system on a front of over thirty-five miles from St. Quentin to Arras having penetrated this battle area to a depth of between 30 and 40 miles. Our troops are now operating far beyond and east of the Hindenburg defense. In the process of these operations and since the date mentioned we have inflicted very heavy losses on the enemy in killed and wounded, and have taken over 110,000 prisoners and 1,200 guns. This feat of arms has been performed by British troops who had already withstood the first heavy onslaughts of the enemy's main forces in the spring. Only the endurance and determination of these troops permitted them to pass to the offensive with such conspicuous success. By their heroic action in defence and attack the men from all parts of the British Empire have proved themselves soldiers of the highest order. The advance continued this afternoon. We have reached the general line of Bohain, Bussigny, Caudry and Caurior.
