placed on a gun carriage, covered with a Union Jack, brought from one of the battlefields of France. The funeral procession will then traverse the route to the Cenotaph. Pall bearers include Lord Beatty, Admirals Meux, Jackson, Sturdee, Madden, Lord French, Lord Haig and Sir Henry Wilson, Lord Horne and Lord Byng. The King with the Royal Princes will await the body at the Cenotaph, where also will be about forty cabinet ministers and ex-Ministers, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dominion High Commissioners, Indian Princes and many other representative men. As Big Ben, the great clock at Westminster, strikes the last stroke of eleven o'clock the King will unveil the Cenetaph and two minutes' silence will follow The "Last Post" from massed buglers will conclude the short service. The procession will then reform, the Archbishop and heads of religious denominations immediately preceding the coffin and pall bearers, and behind the latter the King will be on foot as chief mourner, attended by the Princes. Seats and places have been alloctaed in the Abbey to relatives of fallen warriors, members of the House of Lords and Commons having offered their seats at the ceremony to the mothers of the fallen. So great has been the applications for seats at the two ceremonies, that there has been a lottery for limited
