



#### Twice Crowned

The Imperial Coronation of Napoleon Bonaparte took place in the Church of Notre Dame, the ancient cathedral of Paris, in December, 1804, The crown, having been blessed by the Pope, Pieus VII., Napoleon took it himself from the altar and placed it on his head; after which, with his own hands, he crowned his wife, Josephine as Empress. But to the Imperial crown was soon added a crown reyal—for, following the example of the French some of the people beyond the Alps requested Napoleon to accept the ancient fron Lombard crown—the crown of Upper Italy. Therefore, on May 26, 1805, the ceremony was performed in the splendid but unfinished cathedral of Milan, the Archbishop of Milan officiating, Napoleon, however, was ficiating. Napoleon, however, was less reverential or ceremonious than he had been at Notre Dame; he seized the iron crown and placed it on his brow exclaiming: "God has given it to me, woe to him who attempts to touch it." In the following month the old Genoese Republic was united, not to the Italian kingdom, but to France, and the Republic of Lucca was transand the Republic of Lucca was transformed into a principality, and given to Elisa, one of Napoleon's sisters, and her husband, Bacioceni, to be held as a fief of the French Empire. Thus, the military Republic of San Marino, with its two old cannons, and a population of about a thousand souls, was the only one left in the Italian peninsula. It is an independent State to-day.

#### Pepys and His Diary.

Pepys' Diary is surely the most interesting specimen of that kind of literature ever published, all the more so because he never intended anyone to see it, and wrote it in a difficult kind of shorthand. Born on Feb. 23, 1632 (3), Samuel Pepys was educated. at Magdalene College, Cambridge, and took the degrees of B.A. and M. A. On Dec. 1, 1655, he married Elizabeth St. Michel, a pretty girl of fifteen at St. Margaret's, Westminister. When he began his diary on Jan. 1, 1659-60, he was living in Axe Yard, Westminister, with his wife and one maid, on £50 a year. The same year, however, he became clerk to the Navy at £300 a year. Other offices were afterwards added to this, and his salary steadily increased. By the end of 1668 he had set up a coach with a pair of black horses, and wrote in his diary that he was mighty proud of it. He was a hard worker, often beginning work at four in the morning. He made himself thoroughly efficient in his department, and became one of the best "rulers of the King's Navee" that England has ever had. When he had done his daily work he believed in enjoying himself right well. Music and the theatre were his chief diversions, but any kind of amusement suited him, and he did not miss much. As he put everything in his diary it became a sort of cinema picture of the time, and as the period includes the restoration of Charles II. and the plague and fire of London, there is plenty of interesting matter, indeed, it is the best picture of that time that has come to us. Besides public and court affairs, Pepys put little details of home life, what he had for dinner, when he drank too much, where he went on Sunday, with criticisms of the parson and the sermon, and any pretty girls who may have been in the congregation. All these details are very charming. He gave up writing the diary in 1669, because of weakness in his eyes, though he lived more than thirty years after-wards. He died at Clapham on May 26, 1703, and was buried at St. Olaves, Hart Street. The diary was found in the library of Magdalone College and
