Household Notes.

FIRPO AND WILLS BOX IN NEW YORK IN JULY, SATS RAY. MOND.

New York Matchmaker Says That Both Boxers Have Accepted \$250,000 Offer.

Lewis Raymond, representative of a newly organized New York syndicate, announced to the Associated Press recently that he had word from Buenos Aires that Luis Angel Firpo had accepted the syndicate's offer of \$250,000 for a fifteen-round match with Harry Wills, Negro heavyweight, next July. Wills, he added, already has accepted an offer for a similar amount.

According to Raymond, who declared the syndicate had several millionaire backers, it is proposed to hold the bout in Brooklyn, where options are held on several pieces of property. It is planned to erect an arena seating 100,000 on one of these. Lively bidding for a Firpo-Wills bout has been in progress for some time. Recently Tex Rickard cabled the South American battler a \$200,000 offer after bidding \$100,000 for Wills' signature. The Negro, however, rejected the bid, while Rickard has not yet heard from Firpo.

The National Sportsmen's Club of Newark also announced an offer of \$250,000 made to Firpo, and while this feature was not made clear, it was believed the syndicate represented by Raymond was associated with Newark interests.

Hugh Gartland of Newark, N. J., who conveyed the syndicate's offer to

Firpo, notified William McCarney, Firpo's American representative, that the Argentine pugilist had accepted these terms. Gartland went to South America at Firpo's request to handle the business end of the latter's scheduled fights there with Farmer Lodge and Erminio Spalla.

Firpo and Wills, according to Raymond, each were offered \$250,000 and twenty-five per cent. of the motion picture receipts, each with a privilege of 25 per cent. of the gate receipts in lieu of the guarantee. Padgy Mullins, Wills' manager, has accepted, Raymond said, and contracts are expected to be signed within a month.

Members of the syndicate, according to Raymond, are withholding their names until final articles have been signed.

McCarney pointed out that Firpo's word was not exactly definite and he suggested that Raymond's announcement would better have been withheld until an anticipated cablegram sent by Firpo at slow rates reached here. Until the slow rate message arrives McCarney himself will not know whether Luis Angel has finally accepted.

BOAT POSTPONED.

BUENOS AIRES, March 12.—The 15 round bout between Luis Firpo and Al Relsch of New York, has been postponed until April 5th. The postponement was at the request of Firpo, who is suffering from soreness of a muscle in the left arm which developed after his recent fight with Erminio Spalla.

SKATERS HONORED.

ST. JOHN, N.B., March 12.—Civic recognition of the skating achievements of Charles Gorman, United States national and international outdoor champion, and Willie Logan, a junior skater, at Saranac Lake and at Lake Placid, was given yesterday afternoon when at City Hall, a handsome "coon" coat was presented Gorman and a scholarship in a local business college was given Logan.

CARPENTIER MEETS TOWNLEY, APRIL 27TH.

VIENNA, March 12.—Elaborate preparations are being made by the promoters for the fight on April 27, between Georges Carpentier, former light-heavyweight champion of the world, and Arthur Townley, English light-heavyweight. The match is to be the star event of a boxing carnival, which will be held in the Hohe Warte, where, according to the sport newspapers, alterations are being made to increase the seating capacity to 20,000.

WORLD'S RECORD FOR HIGH HURDLES.

NEW YORK, March 12.—Carl Christensen, of the Newark A.C., set a new world's record in the 60 yard high hurdles at the Metropolitan A.A.U. games in Madison Square Garden last night. His time was 7 3-5 seconds.

The former record of 8 seconds was made by Robert F. Kelly, of the University of Southern California in Brooklyn in 1919.

Aged Clock

Runs Smoothly

NANAIMO—(Can. Press).—An old-fashioned clock, made in 1670, is creating much interest among lovers of antiques. It is a lantern clock, made in the reign of Charles II.

Recently handed to a watchmaker for repairs it was found to need only a lubricant. This supplied, it began to run and now delights all with its novel appearance and peculiar chiming. The clock still retains its original crown wheel escapement, which, most clocks, dating so far back, have long discarded for new parts, and with the exception of a few trivial alterations, runs to-day with the same mechanism installed two-hundred and fifty years ago.

It has a short pendulum, about six and a half inches long, which hangs outside the workings at the back, and a pear-shaped bob. It strikes every half hour, a little hammer striking on a big cast-iron bell on top, and setting the old grandfather's clock, which it somewhat resembles in this particular.

When it was manufactured, minute hands and pendulums had not been long in existence. The dial shows the division into quarters on the outer and inner circle. It is wound by means of a single-leaved weight, covered with brass, suspended from a chain, and runs for thirty hours. The front of the clock consists mostly of the dial. There are doors made of pounded brass on both sides of the bed-post design brass case, and this fits into sockets of a specially designed wooden bucket shelf.

The maker—William Jordast, of London—was in business from 1670 to 1710, and this was one of the first clocks he made. It is the property of Mrs. C. E. J. Millins, Comox Road, Nanaimo, a descendant of the Penn-

family and has been handed down from generation to generation.
