Blenheim is to have a new English
church.
Rev. L. Iler has resigned his charge
at Palmyra.

About ten o'clock Friday morning

about the face, head and hands in fight-
ing the fire. The window of the bed-
room being open, it is supposed the fire
caught from a spark which blew in
from the chimney.

A unique agreement between an Ox-
ford farmer and his wife has just come
to light during a private examination
at the London court house. The farm-
er wanted to execute a mortgage to the
Huron and Erie Society. His wife at
first refused to be a party to the bar-
gain, but finally compromised on the
case he got drunk or absent himself
from home twenty-four hours at a
stretch while the mortgage was in force
the farm was to become the sole prop-
erty of the wife.

Eggs at Two Cents a Dozen.
Before I hit on the plan of paying our
little boy and girl two cents for every dozen
of eggs they bring into the house what a
wearing, drumming time I had of it to get
our hens properly fed and provided with
nest and dust boxes! I always save the
table scraps and a kettle of skimmed milk
for them, thickening the mess with meal or
shorts, and have it hot on the stove each
morning, ready for the men folks or child-
ren to carry to the hens early in the fore-
noon; but the men folks would be sure to
forget it, and the children before I would re-
member to have them feed the biddies; and
there that kettle would stand and stew and
scorch, cluttering my stove half the fore-
noon, and then grow cold when car-
ried away from it, the hens often getting
their breakfast just as they were dying
upon the roost at the early bedtime. And
after school, every day of the week, I must
remember to tell the children to hunt the
eggs, and not having a bit of interest in the
matter, they sometimes forgot, and some-
times half of the nests were not looked
after, and it was all up-hill work for me,
this having the care of the hens, which
were in a building so far from the house I
could not tend them myself.

But paying the children for their work
has changed all this. Without any telling
or reminding, the kettle of scalded milk
and meal is promptly lifted on their little
wagon as soon as I have it ready after
breakfast, and is hauled to the hen-house.
I am besieged for boiled potatoes and meat
scraps and extra pans of milk, and the
hens lay as they have never laid before on
these premises. Boxes for grain, lime,
ashes, burnt bones, and pounded crockery,
they have added to the institution and keep
replenished, and one of the cattle troughs
they have wheeled for their father for the
hens' daily allowance of skimmed milk.

I have not seen a frozen egg all winter, but
every night I have seen two little round
rosy faces, brimful of eager delight and ex-
pectancy, looking in through a crack of the
sitting-room door, hiding behind them a
heaped hatful of eggs, while, with
shining eyes, they asked, "Guess,
mamma; guess how many eggs we-night?"
And sometimes, though I guess away up in
the thirties, they gleefully count out still
more from the old felt hat that is their egg-
basket.—CLARA POTTER, in American
Agriculturist.

ELGIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.
The 29th annual meeting of the El-
gin Baptist Association was held with
the 2nd Dorchester church, assembling
in the village of Gladstone, on Friday
and Saturday, 1st and 2nd insts. It
was preceded by a meeting of the Wom-
en's Missionary Circle, held on the
afternoon and evening of Thursday, at-
tended by Revs. Alex. Grant, general
superintendent of Home Missions, and
James Grant, district secretary of For-
eign Missions, whose addresses were
highly appreciated.

The Association met at 11 a.m., when
after Scripture reading by Rev. R.
Marshall, of Sparta, and prayer by Rev.
A. Grant, an appropriate and sugges-
tive discourse was delivered by Rev. A.
H. Munro on "Home Missions." Rev.
Geo. Mason, of Calton, was chosen
president, and Rev. D. W. Rowland,
clerk, with R. Marshall, assistant.

The business claiming attention at
such gatherings was conducted in per-
fect harmony throughout. A platform
meeting in behalf of education, home
and foreign missions was held in the
evening. Speakers, Revs. Prof. New-
man, of McMaster Hall, A. Grant and
A. Sowerby, of Aylmer. The subject
of Modern Revivals was taken up at
the Saturday morning session. After-
noon session was devoted to public
worship, with prayer and conference.

Statistics showed 152 baptisms for the
last year, and present membership in
all the churches, including four that
sent no reports, to be about two thou-
sand. The next Association will be lo-
cated by the Committee on Arrange-
ments. The church at Gladstone,
though now without a pastor, provided
ample hospitality to all that came.

Rev. D. D. Burch, of Leamington,
preached the introductory sermon at
the Association of Baptist churches,
which opened in Chatham on Tuesday
of last week. Rev. L. Iler was re-ap-
pointed clerk. The attendance of dele-
gates was fair. The church reports
showed an increase of membership in
some cases and a falling off in others.

DEATH OF MR. NAIRN, M. P. P.
Mr. Thomas M. Nairn, M.P.P. for
East Elgin, died at seven o'clock Fri-
day morning at his residence in Ayl-
mer, in the 58th year of his age, after
a fortnight's illness. The deceased has
been a prominent public man, and was
actively associated with municipal, leg-
islative, educational and mercantile af-
fairs for the past thirty years in this
county. He was born in Ballochfoot,
Loch Lomond, Scotland, in 1830, and
had been a resident of Aylmer since
1851, carrying on business as a general
merchant till 1854, when he formed a
partnership with Mr. Henry Martin in
mercantile business, which lasted until
1874, when he took charge of the Air
Line railway in Aylmer. He was first
elected as a municipal councillor in
1858, and was re-elected every year
until 1872. In that year Aylmer was
created a town, with Mr. Nairn as its
first reeve, and he was re-elected each
year until 1878. He served in the
county council for nineteen successive
years, and was elected warden of Elgin
six successive years, from 1866 to 1871.
Mr. Nairn was one of the originators
of the idea of building a railroad across
the lake shore counties, which project
finally culminated in the building of
the Air Line railway, of which he was
the first provisional director, and then
a member of the permanent board,
which membership lasted until the road
was merged into the Great Western.
In 1867 he ran in the Reform interest in
East Elgin, but was defeated by 23
votes. In 1879 he was elected over
Mr. Samuel Day, but in 1883 was de-
feared by Mr. E. O. Ermatinger. At
the last election Mr. Nairn was again
successful at the polls.

No higher testimony could be borne
to the respect in which Mr. Nairn was
held by the people of Elgin, and no
greater evidence of the grief felt at his
demise could be given, than was fur-
nished by the immense concourse of
people that assembled in Aylmer on
Sunday to follow his remains to their
last resting place. From St. Thomas
a train of four cars, all crowded to the
doors, was run over the G. T. R. A
special train was also run from Tilson-
burg, bringing the Masons and Work-
men of that place. By two o'clock lo-
comotion was difficult in the principal
streets of the town. Service was held
in the house, addresses being given by
the clergymen of the town. At the
conclusion of the service those who had
not yet viewed the remains passed
through the house to take a last look at
the well-known countenance of their
departed friend, after which the fune-
ral procession was formed and took up
its slow line of march to the cemetery.
The procession seemed almost intermi-
nable. Half an hour was consumed
in passing a given point, and the length
of the line must have been fully a mile
and a half. The Masons in the pro-
cession numbered about 250; the
Workmen a few less. Arrived at the
grave prayer was offered by Rev. Mr.
Sowerby, and the solemn service of the
Masonic fraternity was read.

Stanley is alive and well, at least he
was last October. This news will be
