Miss Annie Boughner, of Beausville, is the new teacher in the Mainland street school, Strathroy. She commenced her labors on Monday, taking Miss Hanley's class, who assumes charge of Miss Roberts' class, the latter taking the place of Miss Ross, who resigns.

An interesting event took place the other evening in the basement of St. Andrew's Church, Glanworth, at the close of the prayer meeting. When Duncan McCall,

precentor, was presented with two elegant easy chairs and a flower basket.

The Presbytery of Sarnia has decided that the induction of Rev. W. G. Jordan, B.A., to the pastorate of St. Andrew's Church, Strathroy, will take place on Good Friday, Rev. J. Thompson to address the people, Rev. Mr. Culbertson the minister and Rev. J. Anderson acting as moderator.

Mr. Donaldson Barber, one of the oldest residents of the township of Southwold, died in this city on Tuesday after a protracted illness. The remains were taken to the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Thomas Meek, Union, and the funeral took place yesterday at the Fingal cemetery. The deceased was a brother of Mr. Phineas Barber, of Fingal, and was 68 years of age.

A company of German emigrants, nine in number, en route for Chicago, spent last evening at the C. T. R. station. On the trip across the ocean the wife of one of the number presented her better-half with an heir. The little piece of infantile humanity weighs something on the short side of two pounds, and the physicians predict that the diminutive stranger will live out the allotted three score years and ten. Only one of the party could speak English.

Last evening Mr. Herbert M. Miners was the recipient of a very fine copy of "The Teacher's Bible" from his class in Dundas Street Central Methodist Sabbath school. A kindly worded address was read by Mr. Ernest Deane on behalf of the class, in which they expressed their appreciation of the teacher's work among them and their great regret at his removal. Mr. Matthews leaves to-day for Toronto to take a position with Darling & Currie, architects, of that city.

As Duane McPhail, son of A. McPhail, of South Dorchester, was descending the hill to the bridge over Kettle Creek near his home yesterday, his horse stumbled, throwing him head first to the ground. The animal rolled over the prostrate man and fell down the embankment ten or twelve feet. Mr. McPhail was carried to the village in an unconscious state, in which he remained for several hours. Although no bones were broken, he sustained several bad cuts on the face, and internal hemorrhage is feared. (St. Thomas Journal.)

A convenient dark room is being provided, and in the course of a few days everything will be in order for the use of the club.

The Canada Featherbone Company, of St. Thomas, through Messrs. Reid Bros. & Co., of this city, have sent an application to the London City Council asking to be granted a license and remission from taxation for a term of years under the Lyle law allowing those privileges to new factories. The factory is at present enjoying free rent and some back in taxation in St. Thomas. The intention of Reid Bros. & Co., who recently bought the factory, is to erect a new building in this city in which to carry on the business. The application will come before the City Council at its next meeting.

Mr. Wheeler's organ solos were played in style, and he did ample justice to the new organ, bringing out its tones with great effect. Miss Ida Smyth sang unusually well, and her song was one of the best features of the evening. Mr. Williams was scarcely in as good voice as usual and a trifle husky, but he sang in good style all the same. The attendance was fair. After the concert the singers were entertained to a cold collation prepared for them.

"The Broom-Maker of Carlsbad."
James Reilly, the new German comedian and vocalist, appeared at the Grand last evening in the "Broom-Maker of Carlsbad," and was very highly received. The play, which is a comedy, is a musical comedy, as far as the plot is concerned—a villain of the deepest dye, a heroic hero, an unassuming man, a husband and supposed to be dead but who in reality is living and returns, as does the lost child, at the happy ending of the last act. Some really clever personification and specialties are interwoven, however. James Reilly has a pronunciation which, with his full voice, does him credit, although his display of versatility in taking the part of an Irish widow was scarcely a suspicion that in the latter character he was a little more at home. He acted the part of "Johann" to perfection, while his singing was very good. Miss May Temple, singing was the portrayal of a model Dutch girl with yellow braids and shortened skirts. She sang in a manner that captivated the audience. In fact, the only suggestion which could be made is that her dialect might be a little less forced.

The little children with flaxen hair who take the parts of "Hans" and "Ella" are clever youngsters. They have a nice little chorus which they sing as "Johann" teaches them how to make small brooms. Their parts were taken with more naturalness than any of the others, and the hearty manner in which many made known their appreciation was the best evidence of their success. Louise Hennig gave a very fair portrayal of the unhappy wife and mother, while E. G. Spengler did an average villain part. Frank Marion made most of the fun as a rollicking Irishman, and the fun was plentiful. James Reilly is claimed by many to be equal to Emmet, and certainly he makes a strong bid for the position held by that favorite. Anybody could enjoy the performance.
