clothing worn by workmen:

Workmen's astrachan.....75 to 80 per cent.

Linen collars.....50 per cent.

Linen shirts.....50 per cent.

Flannel shirts.....50 per cent.

Men's tweed clothing.....40 to 50 per cent.

Waterproof and oil cloth coats.....50 per cent.

Canadian jackets.....50 to 60 per cent.

Fanta.....50 to 60 per cent.
