FINE, VERY WARM—A FEW STORMS.

TORONTO, Aug. 9.—To-night the pressure is highest over the lower lake region and Atlantic States, and lowest in Manitoba, where there is a storm center moving east. The weather has been fine and warm from Ontario eastward, showery in Manitoba and since morning very cool. Westerly winds have set in over the Northwest Territories. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 52°-68°; Edmonton, 48°-60°; Calgary, 44°-64°; Prince Albert, 40°-72°; Qu'Appelle, 44°-80°; Winnipeg, 52°-82°; Toronto, 64°-82°; Montreal, 64°-82°; Quebec, 60°-82°; Halifax, 68°-84°.

The supreme chief companion's review of the year stated that although sixteen deaths had occurred and other members had moved away, steady progress had been made. One charter had been withdrawn and ten new circles had been formed at London, Montreal, Toronto, St. Thomas, Stratford, Hamilton, Windsor, Vancouver, Victoria and Chatham.

The order has 32 circles and 1,879 members in Canada, and assets of \$6,100. The increase for the last two years was 100 per cent, and the death rate 40 per cent. All the reports were referred to committee.

Stratford Civic Holiday.

A grand afternoon and evening's entertainment is being provided for the Classic City's civic holiday on Thursday, Aug. 24. The object is to raise sufficient money to enable the Stratford General Hospital Board to complete a wing of the hospital, left unfinished for want of funds. The necessity for this being done has now become imperative, owing to the lack of sufficient accommodation at present. The city council and citizens generally have united with the hospital board in providing a programme of amusements for the civic holiday, which ought, with the very best of the city, to insure a large attendance of visitors and the netting of a large sum for this most commendable charitable object.

The day's amusements include horse reel contents for a purse of \$150, divided into two prizes of \$100 and \$50. Bicycle races, with prizes valued at \$200. Lacrosse match between the Toronto and Stratford senior team. Fancy drill by Capt. Clark's company of Guelph, comprising 350 cadets and Highland Regiments, and the Knights of Sherwood Forest and Patriarch Militant. In the evening at the skating rink Capt. Clark's classes will give an entertainment of marching exercises, Indian club swinging, bar bell exercises, layover and sword exercises and fancy drill. Special trains will leave Stratford in all directions after the evening's entertainment.
