SMASHING THINGS

Spaniards in Porto Rico Destroy Military Property.

They Have Dumped Tons of Powder Into the Sea.

Huge Corporation Formed to Develop Resources in Cuba and Porto Rico.

New York, Sept. 8.—A special from San Juan, Porto Rico, says: Spaniards have entered upon a campaign of destruction, contrary to the spirit of the recently signed protocol. Yesterday soldiers were put to work in the arsenal destroying the arms which had been stored there. The rifles and smaller arms were hammered to pieces and then the debris was thrown into the sea.

Word was sent out to the country towns to destroy all arms and ammunition before the arrival of the Americans. Following out this order, the soldiers stacked their arms and then built bonfires about them. Large quantities of powder were also destroyed by fire.

In Fonce tons of powder have been dumped into the harbor.

THE PHILIPPINES TROUBLESOME.

Manila, Sept. 8.—The attitude of the Philippine insurgents is daily becoming more dangerous. So open is their opposition to the American authorities that the situation is strained and it is only a matter of time before what makes the situation the more troublesome is the undisguised rivalry between the followers of Gen. Aguinaldo and the followers of Gen. Emilio.

Gen. Pio Pilar, who covets the honor which Aguinaldo has achieved.

A BIG PERCENTAGE OF OFFICERS KILLED.

Washington, Sept. 8.—The official records of the war department show that there are 35 officers and 221 enlisted men of the army, 224 in all, killed in battles during the war.

The percentage of officers killed is said to be unprecedented in the history of the world. The contrast is especially striking in the case of the battle of Omdurman, where, although the loss of life was heavy, the list of killed included only one officer of the British army.

AMERICAN ENTERPRISE.

New York, Sept. 8.—The American Industries Company, with a capital stock of \$15,000,000, was incorporated in Trenton, N. J., yesterday. Its purpose is to develop the resources of Cuba and Porto Rico. The incorporators number some of the strongest capitalists in New York and Philadelphia. Their charter gives them power to generate, distribute and supply electricity for light, heat, power, etc., to construct, own and operate plants for telegraph, telephone and other purposes, establish steamship lines, railways, etc., and no manufacture, sell and distribute ice or refrigeration.

The depression in the bicycle trade deepens with the advance of the year. In Birmingham, there are between 2,000 and 3,000 men out of employment, and there is great want of employment at Coventry, Liverpool, Limerick, Cork, Nottingham, Redditch and Wolverhampton.

A dispatch has been received from the British minister at Peking confirming the report that Li Hung Chang has been dismissed at his request.

The Hong Kong correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph says: Americans living in the Far East are unanimously in favor of annexation of Luzon, which, so far as finance and trade are concerned, forms the main portion of the Philippines.

The agitation for convoking the French Chamber of Deputies is growing daily. Already notices of 12 interpellations to the Dreyfus affair have been given. Three duels are imminent over the case.
