WAS HE MURDERED?

Body of an Unknown Man Found Near Forest—Evidence of Foul Play.

Forest, Ont., Nov. 13. — Yesterday morning the body of an unknown man was found beside the G. T. R. track, half a mile west of Forest. The left side of his face had been cut open from the mouth to the ear, and the man had apparently bled to death. In the woods near by a party of trampers had encamped Saturday night, and near by were indications that a struggle had taken place, two open knives and a razor case being found there, and a large clot of fresh blood in the grass. The dead man was well dressed in navy blue coat and vest; blue duck pants and good underclothes. He was blind in the left eye from catarract; right forearm tattooed with clasped hands, over which were initials, "M. M.," right hand badly scarred, evidently been lacerated by a saw recently. He had brown hair, fair complexion, medium height, and was about 33 years old. The man had supper here Saturday night, and said he was on his way to Windsor, and had a brother there. The body was brought to Forest and Coroner Scott empaneled a jury.

Four tramps were seen here together Saturday night, one of whom has since been arrested.

HEART AND FAITH WERE BOTH WEAK

Woman Died From Paralysis of Heart in Spite of Christian Science.

Rome, N. Y., Nov. 13.—Coroner Nock, of this city is holding an inquest into the cause of the death of Mrs. Moses M. Davis, who died here under the care of Christian Scientists.

Miss Lizzie Moore, Christian Science healer and first reader in the Rome church, and Horace W. Davison, second reader, testified that they would give only Christian Science treatment to a person who was bleeding to death. Mrs. Davis suffered from a delusion. No physician was summoned or medicine given.

Dr. W. B. Reid, who made a post-mortem on the body, testified that the immediate cause of death was paralysis of the heart. This condition could have been relieved by proper medical treatment and the life of the patient prolonged for a number of years. Dr. C. A. Frost, who assisted in the post-mortem examination, corroborated the statements of Dr. Reid.

The inquest was adjourned until Nov. 14.

The Fighting At Kimberley

Boers Did Little Damage, But "Lifted" a Lot of Cattle.

They Are Well Mounted and Disappear Rapidly.

A British Hussar Reaches Ladysmith From Eastcourt.

Heavy Firing Going On in Vicinity of the Town.

The Beleaguered Garrisons Are Holding Their Own.

Brilliant Sorties Made From Mafeking—Heavy Loss Inflicted on the Enemy.

London, Nov. 13.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Gen. Buller, under date of Cape Town, Nov. 11, afternoon:

"With reference to my telegram of the 10th, Col. Gough, with two squadrons of the 10th Hussars, a battery of field artillery and one and a half companies of mounted infantry, found about 700 of the enemy with one gun in position about nine miles west of Belmont. He engaged the enemy with his artill-

ery and sent the mounted infantry to the enemy's left flank to discover their laager. The losses reported yesterday occurred during the operation. Col. Gough engaged the enemy for about three hours and then returned to camp. The death of Lieut. Wood has just been reported."

A GOOD MAN GONE.

The British lost a good man in Col. Falcener, who was a cousin to the Earl of Kintore. He did good service in the Sudan under Gen. Kitchener from the Dongola expedition to the capture of Berber.

The warships have landed a naval brigade, with 20 guns, for the defense of Durban. The brigade marched through the town amid the greatest enthusiasm.

Dispatches from Kimberley show that the town was vigorously attacked at two different points. It is reported that

one of the British force and six Boers were killed. It is believed here that the Boers surrounded the town in force.

Cape Town, Nov. 13.—The following dispatch, undated, has been received from Kimberley by dispatch rider, via Hope town, Nov. 4:

A MISTAKE.

"In yesterday's fight the Boers made their appearance near Carter's farm. The British opened fire with a Maxim, the enemy replying with rifles. By mistake our fire went down into the valley, killing a member of the Cape police and wounding another. The British finally retired on the reservoir, where two guns were brought up to shell the Boers. The result is not yet known."

"Meanwhile some Boers had occupied Kamper's dam, firing with one gun on Ottos kopje, but not getting the range, they did no damage. It is believed that six Boers were killed in the first fight."

LIFTING CATTLE.

"The Boers now surround Kimberley in great numbers and are bent on 'lifting' cattle and harassing the British. New alarm signals were sounded at 10 o'clock this morning, the enemy having been observed in great numbers and closer to our outposts. They fired on a patrol under Major Peakman, which engaged them, but the firing was at long range. The only casualty was the wounding of Major Ayleff, of the Cape police."

"The enemy 'lifted' forty cattle north-east of the sanitarium, subsequently firing eight shells in the neighborhood of Felsmead's farm at Kenilworth. They did no damage and retired. Later they fired on a number of convicts who were working near the sanitarium, and eventually went off with a large number of cattle and donkeys."

A BIG BOMBARDMENT

Thursday afternoon, Nov. 9.—A party, which rode out several miles about noon to observe the bombardment of Ladysmith, could see a long Tom, a 40-pounder, posted on the railway side of the Bulwer, firing at intervals of six or eight minutes. Another gun was observed firing at a little distance away. Puffs of smoke were discernable on the opposite side, showing that Ladysmith was withstanding a big bombardment. The locality of the town was not anything but a huge cauldron of smoke.

London, Nov. 13—4:30 a.m.—This morning's news from the seat of war in South Africa continues to be satisfactory. The official dispatches are not very detailed as regards the Belmont affair, which, with the exception of the loss of Col. Keith-Falconer, was not a very important action. The Boers are of greatly increased Boer activity in Natal and along the west frontier. All the dispatches tend to show that the British are holding out admirably. Col. Baden-Powell reports that all was well at Mafeking on Nov. 6.

BY GEN. BULLER'S ORDERS.

A special dispatch from Cape Town confirms the earlier report that it was Gen. Buller who ordered the British evacuation of Stormberg and Naauwpoort, as he considered the frontier line too weak and too much extended. Naauwpoort will be occupied again as soon as the advance from Queenstown is ordered.

COURTING THE CAPE DUTCH.

Strong bids are being made by the Boers for the support of the Cape Dutch, but without much success, although it is believed that the Dutch farmers, especially in the Free State district, are armed with Mausers and are watching the course of events before joining the Boers. From Stormberg it is reported that the Free State forces are working steadily toward Dorchester, with a view of attacking Queenstown and cutting off the towns in the northern district of Cape Colony. The wounded are recovering in a remarkable manner. The Mauser wounds are small and heal rapidly. Many of the wounded are applying for permission to go to the front.

THE ATTACK ON KIMBERLEY.

London, Nov. 13.—The chief item of Saturday's news was the opening of the bombardment of Kimberley on Tuesday by Free State artillery, which proved, according to an official statement, utterly ineffective. The Boer investment of the town, however, is said to be tightening. Skirmishing between the Kimberley mounted troops and the Boers early in the week resulted in severe Boer losses.

CONFIDENCE IN GEN. WHITE.

London, Nov. 13.—Ladysmith's latest
