HEART AND FAITH **WERE BOTH WEAK**

Woman Died From Paralysis of Heart in Spite of Christian Science.

Rome, N. Y., Nov. 13.-Coroner Nock, of this city is holding an inquest into the cause of the death of Mrs. Moses M. Davis, who died here under the care

of Christian Scientists.
Miss Lizzie Moore, Christian Science healer and first reader in the Rome church, and Horace W. London, Nov. 13 .- The war offise has received the following dispatch from Gen. Buller, under date of Cape Town, Nov. 11. afternoon:

"With reference to my telegram of the 10th, Col. Gough, with two squadrons of the 10th Hussars, a battery of field artillery and one and a half companies of mounted infantry, found about 700 of the enemy with one gun in position about nine miles west of Belmont. Cape Town, Nov. 13.—The following dispatch, undated, has been received from Kimberley by dispatch rider, via Hopetown, Nov. 4:

A MISTAKE.

"In yesterday's fight the Boers made their appearance near Carter's farm. The British opened fire with a Maxim, the enemy replying with rifles. By mistake our fire went down into the valley, killing a member of the Cape police and wounding another. The Bri-ish finally retired on the reservoir, where two guns were brought up to shell the Boers. The result is not yet known.

"The Boers now surround Kimberley in great numbers and are bent on lifetime" out the great numbers and are bent on tight places, Gen. Joubert might, ere this, be in Pietermaritzburg. Unless the Boer heavy artillery justified itself by reducing Ladysmith, it will again hamper the eventual retreat from Natal, when Gen. Buller sends the relieving force.

THE BOERS' LINE OF RETREAT. It is believed that the Boer retreat will be made over the Drakensberg into the Zouthpansberg district, where every preparation for provisioning and maintaining the Boers is said to have been made for the last stand, and where it will be difficult to dislodge them. Already it is rumored that they are in straits for food around Ladysmith, and may, therefore, abandon the investment. Estcourt advices say that the concrete beds have been laid for the machine shell guns, so there is no fear of the lyddite ammu-nition at Ladysmith having peen exhausted. It is also reported from the same quarter that some fires have been seen in Ladysmith, indicating that the Boer bombardment has been to some

extent effective.

A BIG BOMBARDMENT Thursday afternoon, Nov. 9.-A party, which rode out several miles about noon to observe the bombardment of Ladysmith, could see a long Tom, a 40-pounder, posted on the railway side of the Bulwara, firing at intervals of six or eight minutes. Another gun was observed in operation a little distance away. Puffs of smoke were discernable on the opposite side, showing that Ladysmith was withstanding a big bombardment. The locality of the town was nothing but

a huge cauldron of smoke. London, Nov. 13-4:30 a.m.-This morning's news from the seat of war in South Africa continues fairly satis-The official dispatches are not very detailed as regards the Belmont affair, which, with the exception of the loss of Col. Keith-Falconer, was not a very important action. There are signs of greatly increased Boer activity in Natal and along the west frontier. All the dispatches tend to show that the British are holding out ably. Baden-Powell reports that all was well at Mafeking on Nov. 6.

BY GEN. BULLER'S ORDERS. A special dispatch from Cape Town confirms the earlier report that it was Gen. Buller who ordered the British evacuation of Stormberg and Naaulawpoort, as he considered the frontier line too weak and too much extended. Naalawpoort will be occupied again as soon as the advance from Queenstown is ordered.

COURTING THE CAPE DUTCH. Strong bids are being made by the Boers for the support of the Cape Dutch, but without much success, although it is believed that the Dutch farmers, especially in Picquetberg dls-trict, are armed with Mausers and are watching the course of events before joining the Boers. From Stormberg it is reported that the Free
State forces are working steadily toward Dordecht, with a view of attacking Queenstown and cutting off the
towns in the northern district of Canal towns in the northern district of Cape Colony. The wounded are recovering in a remarkable manner. The Mauser wounds are small and heal rapidly. Many of the wounded are applying for permission to go to the front.

THE ATTACK ON KIMBERLEY. London, Nov. 13 .- The chief item of Saturday's news was the opening of the bombardment of Kimberley on Tuesday by Free State artillery, which proved, according to an official state-ment, utterly ineffective. The Boer in-vestment of the town, however, is said to be tightening. Skirmishing between the Kimberley mounted troops and the Boers early in the week resulted in severe Boer losses. Col.
