

A THRILLING STORY

How Sergt. Richardson, of the Strathconas. Saved a Brother Officer and Won the Victoria Cross.

The first Canadian to win the Victoria Cross was Sergt. Arthur Herbert Lindsay Richardson, of Strathcona's Horse. The winning of the cross is one of the most thrilling escapades in the war. The story of the gallant deed is just coming to

At Walverspruit, near Standerton, on the 5th of July last, 38 members of Strathcona's Corps were pursuing some Boers. Before proceeding very far they found themselves in an amquarters of 300 yards. Hopelessly outnumbered there was nothing for the small party to do but fly back to camp and shelter. They wheeled round and were off, but Corp. McArthur, wounded, was left behind. Sergt. Richardson noticed this and rode back alone to aid his comrade. He dis-mounted and lifted the wounded man to his horse. The Boers were quite close, and felt sure of capturing him "Throw up your hands!" they said. For answer Sergt. Richardson jumped

on his horse and galloped off A volley of bullets whistled past him as he did so, and the Boers came out of their hiding and pursued the flying

Richardson rode straight for camp. but a barbed wire fence crossed hi path, and it was imposside for the it. Turning his horse sharply, Richardson rode by the side of the fence with the object of finding a gap. Boers were now gaining rapidly and the foremost of the party was only 100 yards away. Others came up, and a continuous fire was directed at Richardson. After racing for 300 or 400 yards the sergeant came to a gap in the fence. The two upper strands of wire were broken, but the bottom line about a foot from the ground, remained intact. Richardson turned his

horse towards the opening, and spurred it for a final effort. The animal, tired by the pace, and the weight he bore, refused. Nothing daunted, the sergeant turned his horse for another attempt. He would have falled again but for a Boer bullet, more accurate than the rest, which missed the rider, but hit the horse. The animal gave a sudden plunge and galloped madly forward. The Boers gave up the chase, and Richardson and his comrade reached the camp in safety, but the horse paid the penalty of their rescue, for it dropped dead an hour later. He was a popular man in the corps before but the rescue of McArthur made him a hero.
