FOR THE NORTH POLE.

Lieut, Peary's Arctic Expedition—Getting Ready.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 22.—Writing from St. Johns, Nfld., Lieut, Peary says the sailing steamer Falcon will be ready to sail by June 15. The same route will be taken as in 1891 on the Kite, going by way of Baffin's Bay into Smith's Scund, and thence to McCormick Bay. Here the winter quarters will be established in latitude 77 degrees, 43 minutes north, near the site of the former expedition. The supplies—Arctic clothing, sleeping bags, sledges, etc.—will be taken from St. Johns to avoid delay in securing them in Greenland, but a stop will have to be made at Godhaven or Upernavik for sledging dogs. The present expedition will cover at least two years, and the party will include Lieut. Peary, Dr. F. Cooke, surgeon of the former Peary expedition; Elvard Astrup, the young Norwegian who went the farthest north with Lieut. Peary on the first expedition; Samuel Entricken, of Westchester, now a teacher in the manual training school in Aiken, S. C.; Mr. Davison, manager of Feary's lecture tour, and Peary's colored body servant, Matthew Hensen.


