not so plentiful today; sales were made at 55c to 46c per bag, or 45c per bushel; tomatoes were plentiful, at 20c to 25c per basket; onions, \$1 per bushel; celery, 35c to 40c per dozen; pumpkins, 5c to 10c each; other vegetables as quoted.

Poultry—Very little offered; quite a few pairs of spring chickens sold at 55c to 60c per pair, alive, and 60c to 75c per pair dressed; ducks, dressed, sold at 70c to \$1 per pair; turkeys, 12c per lb, dressed, and 10c alive.






