ON CITY BEAUTIFUL

Broken Stone

FOR DUNDAS ST.

There Will Be No "Monkeying"
With the Original
Specifications.

The Barber Asphalt Company will make
no reduction in the price of the contract,
whether gravel or broken stone is used
for the Dundas street pavement.

The announcement is definite, a member
of the company, in Buffalo informing the
board of works by telephone last night
that under no circumstances would the
company agree to a reduction.

The company declared that it was will-
ing to go ahead with the contract as it
stood.

Further, the company declared that it
would agree to nothing that would in any
way tend to invalidate the present con-
tract.

Gravel could be used, declared this re-
presentative, but the company would as-
sume no risk in reference to it.

Ald. Saunders speaks.

Ald. Saunders discussed the matter at
some length with the committee, and de-
clared that his first impression that the
company would not make any discrep-
ancy in the price had been borne out. He
had been told that the company would not
make a cent's reduction, and now he
knew that it was so. The only reason
that he supported the change was be-
cause nearly \$10,000 would be left in the
city if gravel were used instead of broken
stone, and the work would not be held
up so long. The gravel made just as
good a base as broken stone. He was in
favor of leaving the matter over until
another meeting.

Ald. Stewart also advanced the same
arguments, and thought the matter should
be laid over for another week at least.

Broken Stone.

This means that broken stone will be
used in the Dundas street pavement.
Most of the people on that street are in
favor of broken stone, and will insist
upon it.

It was stated some time ago that the
company was in favor of making a re-
duction of from \$700 to \$1,200.

However, the work that has developed
of late has changed the company's mind,
and now it is perfectly willing to go ahead
with the contract as it stands, and use
broken stone.

City is Saved.

There is no doubt that gravel is much
cheaper than broken stone, and especially
for the Barber Company, who will then
be able to do the work to completion and
not suffer the expense of delays
caused by waiting for broken stone.

This means that the London Street Rail-
way will also have to use broken stone
in the track allowance.

Appoint Diocesan Commissioner

Synod Committee So Decides

The Quarterly Meeting of the

Executive Was Held Yes-

terday in London.

The quarterly meeting of the execu-
tive committee of the Diocese of
Huron was held yesterday in Cronyn
Hall with a large attendance of mem-
bers from all over the diocese. Bishop
Williams presided and at the morning
session Secretary Swaisland read the
report of the land and investment
committee, which showed that every-
thing was in the most prosperous con-
dition, all available funds being in-
vested in satisfactory securities.

The Beneficiary Fund.

A communication from the Diocese
of Niagara regarding reciprocity in the
beneficiary fund was read.

At present if a pastor goes from the
Diocese of Huron to the Diocese of
Niagara, he is entitled to partake of
the beneficiary fund in that diocese,
and vice versa.

The secretary for Niagara wrote,
asking if the reciprocity would be con-
tinued, and it was decided that it
would be of advantage to both dioc-
eses if the present arrangements
were allowed to continue.

The report of Diocesan Commis-
sioner Young was read and adopted.

Afternoon Session.

At the afternoon session, the ques-
tion of appointing a diocesan commis-
sioner for three years and paying him
a salary of \$1,500 a year, was dis-
cussed.

It was decided that such an of-
ficer should be appointed, and he will
be named at the next meeting of the
Synod of Huron.

It was also decided to offer the ap-
pointment of Ven. Archdeacon Young,
of Paris.

A commission will be appointed to
visit Alveston, Oil Springs, Inwood,
Dover and Mitchell's Bay, with the
object of re-arranging the parishes.

Bishop Williams appointed Arch-
deacon McKenzie, Canon Craig and
Messrs. Matthew Wilson and Edwin
Paul to be a committee to inquire into
and report as to whether the mis-
sionaries at Grand River are entitled
to share in the beneficiary fund of
the diocese. Ven. Archdeacon Mc-
Kenzie reported the sum of \$10,534 has
been collected for the jubilee fund.

Various Matters.

St. James' Church, Euphrasia, was
given permission to mortgage the
church and rectory for \$1,400 to build
a new church.

Holy Trinity Church of Lucan was
given permission to sell their church
and build a new one.

Requests from Ascension Church,
Windsor, asking permission to raise
\$3,000 by mortgage on their new
church and of Trinity Church, Nor-
wich, asking leave to transfer their
mortgage were granted.

St. John's Church, Sarnia, agreed to
accept as its boundaries the boundar-
ies of ward 4 of Sarnia.

A grant of \$50 for repairs to St.
Peter's Church on the Sarnia Indian
Reserve, was ordered on condition
that \$50 be raised locally.

Mrs. McCosh, widow of Rev. Rob-
ert McCosh, was placed on the wid-
ows' and orphans' fund.

Canon Hicks, Archdeacon Richard-
son, J. B. Buckle and H. Macdonald
were appointed to draft a convening circular
for the next executive meeting to be
held on May 25.
