IS HALL THE MAN WHO WORKED LONDON?

Individual Arrested in England Is Thought To Be the Fake Check Artist Wanted Here.

A dispatch to The Advertiser states that Frank Hall, wanted in many Canadian cities, including London, on fraud charges, has been placed under arrest in London, England, by Scotland Yard.

Hall is believed to be the man who flimflammed several local firms last summer by presenting checks signed "Passmore." He was closely followed at the time, but managed to get away. He is said to have operated in Toronto, Galt, Guelph, Stratford, Windsor, Detroit and Chicago, and in many other Canadian and American cities. Hall, it is stated, has served several long terms for forgery and came to this city from London, England, in 1906.

BIRTHDAY GATHERING OF THE HARRIS FAMILY

An Interesting Celebration and a Happy Reunion in a Delaware Home.

An Advertiser subscriber in Delaware sends the following interesting account of a birthday celebration recently held at the home of a family widely known in that township:

The 89th anniversary of the birthday of Mrs. Gilbert Harris has just been celebrated at her home in Delaware by her sons, all of whom were present, excepting the eldest, Dr. Geo. W. of New York, who was unavoidably absent owing to business. Mrs. Harris has received many congratulatory letters and cards during the last few days from friends in various parts of the country, while numerous old-time friends also called to offer congratulations. The lady was also the

recipient of many useful and beautiful gifts.

Mrs. Harris evinces a youthfulness of spirit and vivacity of interest, strongly characteristic of her nature, so seldom seen in one of her advanced age. She grows old very slowly, her faculties showing very little sign of decay, and though her memory is beginning to fail, her mind is as clear as ever, and she is still very interesting in her conversation. She loves to relate her experiences of early pioneer life, and her graphic account of the troubles of 1837 and the early history of the county of Middlesex and city of London, is not only interesting, but instructive.

Mrs. Harris was born in Westminster Township, being a daughter of the late Mr. B. Davis. Her father was one of the Middlesex pioneers, and helped to cut the timber and erect the first house built in the city of London. He was also the first man in the Province to be married by a Methodist minister.

Mrs. Harris is a type of the hardy and strong race, the members of which are fast passing away. She enjoys the distinction of being the oldest resident of the township, having resided there continuously for over 66 years. Mrs. Harris is undoubtedly the oldest living native-born resident of these parts, and has been a member of the Methodist Church for three-quarters of a century.

Many and wonderful have been the changes and developments that have taken place during this period. The Harris family have been readers of the London Advertiser ever since its inception, and they desire to congratulate its publishers on the growth and prosperity of their favorite newspaper.

He did so without effort. She added that it was time that he hand over his money.

"Now beat it down the street," said she, when she had cleaned out all he had.

"I beat it all right," said Lenzo, "not looking back until I had gone half a block. Then I stood and watched her. She entered a waiting taxicab and disappeared."
