WHITE HALF-WAY IN AERIAL RACE

Paulhan's F-lish Rival Badly Distanced in \$50,000 Flight.
Manchester, April 28.—Paulhan, in his aeroplane, left London at 5:20 o'clock last evening, and reached Manchester at 5:30 o'clock this morning. He descended at Litchfield at 8:10 o'clock last night, and resumed the trip at 4:09 a.m.

White, his opponent in the race, started from London at 6:30 last night, and alighted at Northampton at 8 p.m. He again started at 2:50 o'clock this morning, but was compelled to descend at Polesworth after he had covered a little more than half of the 186 mile race in 11 hours and 11 minutes' actual flying time in the air, unofficial.

PAULHAN WIN DERBY

(Continued from Page One.)
From his friends and the crowd the aviator received a warm reception, but he was too tired to reply to the ovation. Presently he went to a hotel and retired.

Paulhan did the last 24 miles in exactly 24 minutes, thus outdistancing the special train bearing his wife, Henry Farnham, and other friends who had accompanied him.

White Cheers Frenchman.
When at Polesworth, White was told of the Frenchman's success, he mounted the seat of an automobile and cried:

"Ladies and gentlemen, the \$50,000 prize has been won by Louis Paulhan, the finest aviator that the world has ever seen. Compared with him I am only a novice. Three cheers for Paulhan!"

The crowd gathered about the generous Englishman, gave the cheers heartily, following them with a round of cheers for White. He said:

"There is no longer an opportunity for me to win the prize, but I mean to get to Manchester and by aeroplane."

Speaking of the flight which he made White said:

"I was completely turned around three times by the wind. I tried my best to get along against it, but unfortunately it was no use, and I was forced to plane down. I managed to get over the telegraph wires and got a start over the track of the railroad at Road by aid of signal lights, but over a good many miles about Rugby I saw no signal light, and there was considerable wind. I could see clouds racing across the moon, and when daylight came breezes were still vigorous, and the gusts troubled me a lot."

Following the example of the Frenchman, who got away from London an hour ahead of him yesterday, White was in the air at 2:50 o'clock, more than an hour before Paulhan started from Litchfield, 50 miles further north. White passed Rugby just before day broke, flying at a great height, and with terrific speed, and in an effort to make up the distance which he had lost by his late start yesterday. He kept to his speed, following the railway line as well as he could in the uncertain light over Nuneaton and Atherston, and when he was compelled to descend at Polesworth, he was within ten miles of Litchfield, from which point Paulhan had started but a moment before.

Paulhan upon ascending at Litchfield sharply at 4:09 o'clock this morning, was hurried on by the news that White already was in the air, and approaching Litchfield. Paulhan encountered a sharp southwest wind, which, while toward the end of his journey made it almost impossible for him to keep a firm grasp on the levers, helped him on his way.

An immense crowd was gathered at the field, where the machine was stored over night, and along the roads leading northward, and they gave the Frenchman encouraging cheers, although their sympathies naturally were with their fellow countryman. As he flew gracefully over them the French aviator made a wide circuit to get his bearings, and when he had determined his course, he mounted to a good height, just missing a tall elm tree in the ascent. Then he sailed directly for Stafford, the aeroplane swaying perilously in the wind.

Paulhan followed the railway line all the way to Manchester, usually at a height of 300 feet, but ascending to 700 feet when passing over towns, and the people who turned out to cheer, saw but a speck in the sky.

White was one of the first to telegraph congratulations to his rival. His message read:

"Take the earliest opportunity of offering you my heartiest congratulations on your splendid performance. The better man has won."

BOY-SCOUTS PATROL FOR STRATFORD

Class Started Following Plan of Gen. Baden-Powell.
Stratford, April 27.—Rev. G. F. Salton, Central Methodist Church, Stratford, has started an undenominational class of instruction in connection with the Boy Scout Organization, of which Gen. Sir Baden-Powell is chief scout. To start with, the class who may connect themselves with the organization are termed "new recruits," from which they will be raised to "second class," and, finally, upon passing a strict examination, which requires special proficiency in swimming, running, etc., to "first-class." The class will meet in the schoolroom of Central Church, and Mr. Salton is in hopes that one or more patrols will be raised to the first-class by May 31 when His Excellency the Governor-General visits Stratford.

This evening the Square Club of the Stratford Collegiate Institute held a banquet in the boys' room at the Y. M. C. A. as a fitting close to the splendid meetings held at the school during the winter month. The banquet was largely attended, and a very pleasant social evening spent.

Budget Again Reaches Lords

London, April 27.—Chancellor Lloyd George's finance bill, the rejection of which by the House of Lords cost the nation, as Premier Asquith announced in his final speech tonight, \$6,500,000, in actual money, passed the third reading in the House of Commons today, by a majority of 93, amid cheers from the ministerialists.

It was immediately carried to the House of Lords, which was waiting in session to receive it. In quite uneventful fashion the Lords passed the first reading of the bill.

THE DOCKERS AT PT. EDWARD OBJECT TO THE FOREIGNERS

One Hundred Longshoremen Employed by Northern Navigation Company Quit Work When Staff Is Augmented by a Number of Bulgarians and Italians.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Sarnia, April 28.—Because they say they object to working alongside foreigners, 100 longshoremen employed at the Point Edward docks by the Northern Navigation Company went on strike last night. The men are employed day and night at the rate of 25 cents an hour. Recently the company decided that it required a larger staff, and consequently 28 foreigners, principally Bulgarians and Italians, arrived on the scene last night, and were at once put to work. The regular

staff immediately quit, declaring they would not return to work until the new men are dropped. The real reason appears to be that they fear the company may cut the rate of wages if they can secure a sufficient number of non-union dockers.

The company, on the other hand, declares there is a scarcity of labor of any kind, and that it simply augmented its staff in order to handle its business. There is a possibility of the difficulty being patched up this afternoon.

ADDRESS WAS PRESENTED TO REV. J. G. PERDUE

Departing Pastor Honored at a Meeting of Anglican Clerical Association.

A special meeting of the London Anglican Clerical Association was held this morning in Bishop Cronyn Hall, a large number of the clergy being present. The following illuminated address was presented to Rev. J. G. Perdue, who has for some years acted as honorary secretary of the association:

"To the Rev. J. G. Perdue, M. A.: The members of the Clerical Association of London desire to express their sincere sense of regret at your departure from their midst, on account of your recent illness. As the honorary secretary of our association, you have, by your courtesy, earnestness and fidelity, won the esteem of your clerical brotherhood, and your unfailing good humor and your unflinching suggestions have added no little interest to our gatherings. We will follow your career with the deepest sympathy and goodwill, and pray that wherever you may be, the blessing of the Lord may rest richly upon you."

Signed on behalf of the Clerical Association, Dean of Huron, President, London, Canada, April 28, 1910. Mr. Perdue expressed his thanks in a very happy and convincing manner, and assured the members that the meetings had been one of the greatest sources of pleasure to him.

AMERICAN PUBLISHERS CLAMOR FOR PULP

Want United States Government to Hurry Relations With Canada.

New York, April 28.—Interest at the session of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association here today centred largely in the report of the committee on paper, submitted by John Norris, chairman.

A considerable portion of the report was devoted to a review of the pulpwood situation and the tariff complications with Canada involved in it. Hope was expressed that coming conferences arranged for by the Canadian authorities and President Taft would result in adjustment of the trade relations between the two countries, and permit of a full and free supply of pulpwood, leaving the tariff question, attributed to the tariff tangle, and aggravated by the existing paper mill strikes.

The report urged measures to hasten action for removing the menace of millions of dollars' loss to newspapers through the prolongation of present conditions until next winter, and to end the suspense of awaiting the uncertain decision of special interests in Congress. The adoption of the Mann bill in Congress for the encouragement of newsprint manufacture in Canada and the United States, was advocated. The reading of the report was followed with interest by the publishers, who concluded with a vote of thanks to the meeting here by joining the Associated Press in a banquet for members of both organizations, at the Waldorf-Astoria.

Toronto, April 27.—Soft Borgow, a Pole, who says she was the weak from Buffalo, was arrested this morning on the charge of attempting to defraud Alexander Willofski, also a Pole, of \$96.

MYSTERIOUS SUICIDE.
Montreal, April 27.—Arthur H. Hatch, who died as the result of drinking wood alcohol in Mount Royal Park Hospital, Tuesday, was a cultured Englishman of Oxford, and a musician of considerable ability. He was honorary secretary of the Children's Aid Society, and recently wrote a series of interesting and able articles on the management of such organizations for a local paper. Just why he should have wanted to kill himself is at present a mystery.
