#### ELECTRICITY AND PLANT GROWTH. [Manchester Guardian.]

The effect of electrical discharges or plant growth was the subject of a lecture delivered yesterday at the Royal Agricultural Hall, London, by Mr. J. H Priestly, lecturer in botany at the University of Bristol.

Mr. Priestly referred to a series of experiments made outside Bristol, and also at Evesham, where Mr. J. Newman had electrified about twenty acres of wheat land with notable success. By means of a small engine and dynamo, in the absence of a local electricity plant, the low tension current was transmitted to the field by wires, and there in a suitable outhouse the current underwent a change to high tension through the medium of Sir Oliver Lodge's induction coil. The current was then circulated over a sort of barbed wire arrangement above the plants, each of the barbed points acting as a distributing point for the electrifluid.
