MAY AMEND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA ACT

Premiers of Ontario and Quebec May Call a Meeting.

Toronto, Oct. 24.—The Interprovincial conference held Saturday in Toronto resulted in the discussion of a proposal, it is understood, to amend the British North America Act, so that the number of representatives given each province when it entered confederation will be the minimum. Above that minimum the present system will continue to govern.

It is likely that the premiers of Ontario and Quebec will call a formal meeting of provincial representatives to discuss this and other matters in detail, and to take definite action.

At the last session of this parliament of provincial premiers, held at Ottawa, the heads of the Ontario and Quebec Governments were appointed joint conveners of future conferences. It was the original intention to hold these gatherings every year, but the difficulties experienced in securing the convenience of the various interests involved in the absence of misist subject matter caused this purpose to be abandoned in the two knights who placed upon the two knights who presided over the pioneer provinces.

The primary purpose of the proposed conference will be to discuss the basis of representation in the Dominion Parliament as it affects the various provinces. The point is raised, it is understood, by the Maritime Provinces, which are threatened with further loss of representation as the result of the coming census. Under the British North America Act the Province of Quebec is the standard for determining the basis of representation, and the fact that the census returns showed that the population grew more rapidly in this province than in some of its eastern sisters, resulted in a shrinkage of their representation in Parliament. For instance, it is pointed out that when Prince Edward Island entered confederation in 1873, she was accorded six members, while at the present time her representation is reduced to three.

The proposal to secure an amendment to the act under which the minimum representation of the various provinces will be fixed at the number they were given when they entered confederation, the present system with membership can never fall below the initial figure, and reduction of representation will not be a danger beyond that point. As to the basis above that minimum, the present system with Quebec as the standard, will continue to govern.

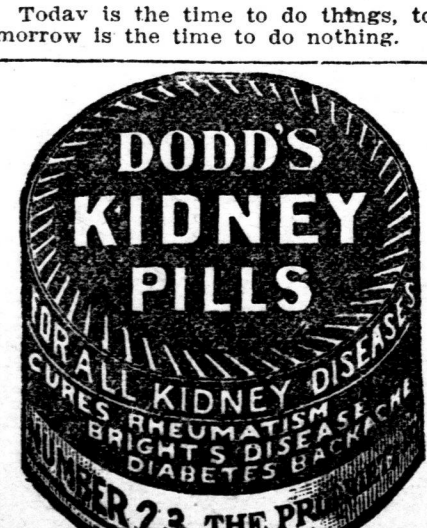
Confirmation Services.

In the world. The Athletics were there to triumph and the Cubs were cuffed into complete subjection.

It seldom falls to the lot of even a world's championship team to win its title in such clean-cut fashion as Mack's men did today. They went through the whole battle with a fumble by Baker as their only misplay. The fielding of Jack Barry at short easily put into the distant shade any other meritorious features except the stanch pitching of Coombs. To be sure, Collins hit like a madman, with two screaming two-baggers and a single to his credit, but in the field most of the glory went to Barry.

SHORTSTOP BARRY ACCEPTED SIX CHANCES.
Only six chances went Barry's way, but they all looked like base hits until he snatched them up and converted them into outs. His support of Coombs was what kept the Cubs at bay in the early rounds. Naturally the devastation caused by the Athletics' hitting in the eighth left the Cubs in such a groggy condition that Coombs didn't need any further protection.

Manager Mack made a change in his line-up for the last game, sending Topsy Hartel to the top of the batting order in place of Strunk. Topsy was a vast improvement over Amos. The white-head scored two runs, stole two bases and hit safely once. Likewise, he jumped into the left field seats and clawed down a two-bagger for Joe Tinker at the start of the Cubs' portion of the seventh round. He almost disappeared from view, but quickly sallied forth with the ball in his hands and the catch was allowed. Had that hit got away at the start of the lucky seventh the Cubs might have put something over. It was well to stop trouble there.

Another change in the line-up of the Athletics was occasioned by an injury to Catcher Thomas' throwing hand in yesterday's game. Lapp went behind the plate to handle Coombs' delivery and the young fellow was there like a duck. He caught almost perfect ball, throwing runners out in splendid style, and don't overlook the fact that it was Lapp's good single in the fifth which put the Athletics into the lead, 2 to 1, they having scored one in the first and been tied up ever since.

COOMBS HAS LOT ON BROWN.

While the hits were nine for each team, Coombs pitched rings around Brown, excelled him in every way, particularly in control.

It was nothing for Coombs to get three balls and no strikes on a batter and then go ahead and whip the next three over. Willness was the lanky one's only trouble in his other game.

This time he had marvellous command. He had that curve hitting the ball's eye all the time and the Cubs were helpless. Coombs had learned the weakness of every one of Chicago's men and in the pinches they were hanging on the ropes.

Perhaps the feat that stands out above everything in the series was Coombs' grand work in the fourth inning when the score was a tie at 1 to 1. Jack gave his only base on balls in that session, Hoffman being the lucky man to receive it—and after two strikes had been called on him. Manager Chance tried to bait Hoffman ahead, but Coombs kept pitching the ball high and fast to the Cub leader until the demon boss tapped one at the pitcher. Coombs snatched it up and forced Hoffman at second. Zimmerman clouted one to left for a sack and when Baker booted Steinfield's grounder, the only break in the Athletics' grand defence, the sacks were full with only one out.

ATHLETICS IN A HOLE.

That was a sensation to drive Chicago mad. The rotters were up on their toes, and say talk about welcoming T. R. in the west, that was nothing with the hullabaloo. It seems to require just such crisis to bring out the best there is in Coombs. Tinker was the first man up, and Joe is some tough customer to deal with at such times.

Coombs studied his man carefully, and put everything he had in his box of tricks into every ball he pitched. Joe took three healthy wallops, shook his kinky head and walked to the bench. The crowd sank back in the seats with a groan, although they still had some hope in Archer, whose timely two-bagger won yesterday's game for the Cubs. Archer could do no more than Tinker, not as much in fact, since he missed the ball by a foot instead of inches.

Coombs doubtless would have shut the Cubs out had he pitched more carefully to Manager Chance. He made Chance look foolish, and then laid the next one over, instead of trying to make the boss hit at wide ones. A two-bagger resulted, and it blossomed into a fine young tally. Jack was as careless in the eighth, and let Chance drive home the Cubs' other run when studious work probably would have prevented such a thing. He had runs enough behind him then so that he did not begrudge the manager of the fallen idols another hit, and he served up one already tagged for a single. That was small solace for the home fans, though.

BROWN'S EFFORT PRACTIC.

There was something pathetic about Brown's pitching. The old master was himself for seven rounds, and gave Coombs all Jack wanted to handle. But the wise ones were predicting that something was coming to Brown, since he seemed to be wearing himself down by his supreme efforts. For seven rounds his curve ball was a wonder. He struck out seven men with it, and ordinarily had little difficulty keeping the Athletic sluggers within bounds. That still, however, the cyclone struck him.

Four hits were all the champions he made off him until the eighth opened. But Brown could not go on further. He had shot his bolt, and staggered through the next to the last round on his nerve. That avails little against a gang of terrorists out for the biggest championship in the sporting world, and bundles of prize money, which is another reason for rejoicing at victory.

Brown has been the best pitcher on Chance's payroll since the Cubs won their first league pennant in 1906. He was certainly the only choice for this emergency, but he couldn't go the route.

The whaling even Brown made the Cub fans so much the sicker. It left them not a crumb of consolation. Twice the stake had been started for the National League people to do now but admit that the Athletics are away beyond the Cubs' class. When one stops to think of the scores in this series—4 to 1, 9 to 2, 12 to 5, 3 to 4, and 7 to 2—with the Cubs forced to go ten innings to get their only victory, and that being extremely lucky, he can get some estimate of the difference in the teams.

ATHLETIC TWIRLERS THREW ONLY 621 BALLS

An Average of 124 Per Game—Statistics Are Busy With Figures.

Chicago, Oct. 24.—In final defeat of Chicago for the world's championship, Coombs, the Philadelphia pitcher, who already had won two games, threw only 120 balls to the plate, while Mordecai Brown, the Cub twirler, in his effort to stop the team which finally became champions, hurled 142.

As compared with the former games, Coombs' twirling was about equal. On Monday at Philadelphia Bender threw 120 balls to the plate. On Tuesday Coombs threw 151, the game in which he gave nine bases on balls. On Thursday he threw 120, and on Saturday he threw 142.

Chicago pitchers in the opening game in the east threw 101 balls to the batters. On Tuesday 149, and on Saturday 135, as against 142 yesterday.

During the series the Chicago pitchers threw 659 balls to the plate, as compared with 621 by the Athletics.
